Dec. 13th,- Russian despatch states that up to the 13th nothing of importance had occurred be fore Sebastopol. Some small sorties had been between three hundred and four hundred worms successful, in one of which the Russians captured some small mortars, and spiked others larger. The fire of the Allies continued feeble. The Russian defences on South side are estimated at 100 guns-stronger than when the seige begun. On the other hand the British have erected a very powerful new battery, not yet opened, on an eminence south of the valley of Inkerman, and commanding every house in Sebastopol, besides being another step towards the complete investiture of the place, not I hear and bear and par spall sorred

Since the siege began 20 British have deserted to the Russians: The Russian deserters say that provisions and ammunition are becoming scarce in Sebastopol. It was observed that the Russians were arming their ships in Sebastopol harbour, probably to attempt surprise by sea. General Inprandicis deprived of command for a fault committed at Inkerman on the 5th November.

BRITAIN .- The Bill to enlist 40,000 Germans had a protracted debate. D'Israeli and his party in the Commons opposed it, but would not throw any unfair obstacle in its way. Sir Lytton Bulwer moved that it be read that day six-months .-Milner Gibson said "the enlistment of foreign mercenaries independently of their government, violated the principles of neutrality and might be taken advantage of by the Russians to hire privateers in the United States. Debate also resumed on the Militia Bill-the Earl of Derby and his party opposing the removal of the Militia, which is essentially a home force to foreign garrisons. He did not however move an amendment, consequently the Bill was read a second time and passed thro' committee. A discussion ensued on a bad bargain made by the British Admiralty, in exchanging the British frigate Thetis against two Prussian gun boats. Lord John Russell stated that the number of troops France was willing to send to the war was only limited by the number of the transports, England did not propose to take Frenchmen into pay before proposing the Foreign Enlistment Bill.

Austria .- The Morning Chronicle publishes the Vienna ratification of the Triple Treaty. It is reported that Rossia accepts the four points as the basis for peace negotiations, but the razing of Sebastopol is the destruction of the Black Sea fleet, and will never voluntarily be ceded If inoffensive equivalents had been proposed, Russia promises acceptance The Empress of Austria has sent the decoration of Saint Stephen as a mark of friendship to Napoleon,
