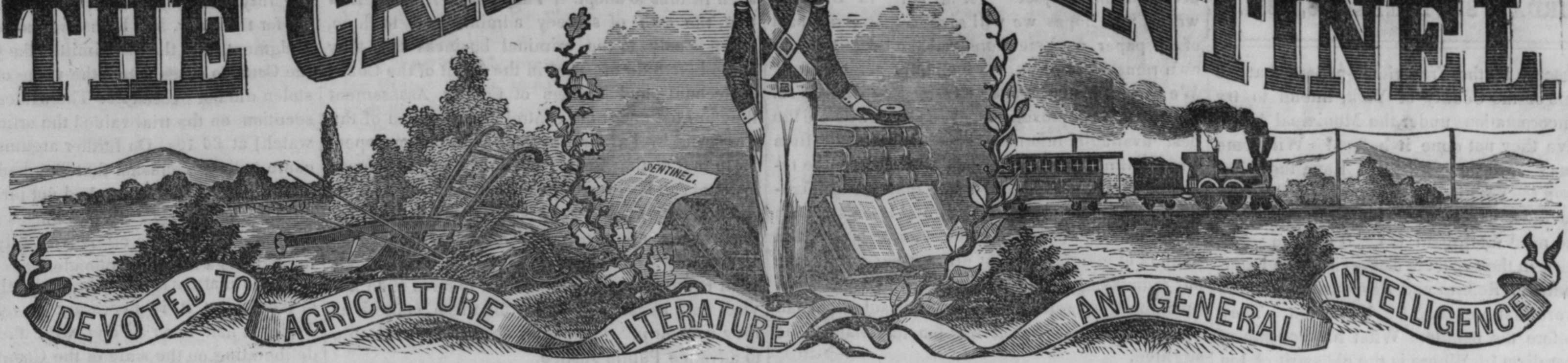

TO be delivered at the Establishment of the Subscribers, at the Lower Corner, for which the following prices will be paid, viz:—For all delivered before the first of October next, 17s. 6d. After, by sledging, 15s. per cord. The Bark in all cases to be well saved, and in good condition or not received.

Directions for curing Bark.—When Peeled in dry weather to be turned the flesh or inner side to the sun during the day and turned over at night, in two days it will be cured sufficient to be piled or yarded. If the weather is wet it should be stooked with the ross side to the weather and covered with sheets that are whole to protect it from the wet, it should remain so for two or three fine days, after which it may be piled or hauled together. The piles intending to remain until hauled to us, should be at least six feet high and higher if convenient.

Care should be taken to reserve the whole and wide sheets for placing on the top, as much Bark is spoiled by neglecting this necessary precaution.

RULES FOR THE GUIDANCE OF COMPETITORS.

RULE 1.

The Exhibitor must be a Member of the Society at least one month prior to the day of Exhibition.

RULE 2.

Persons offering for Premiums, must furnish the Secretary with a list of the articles intended for exhibition, before 8 o'clock on the morning of the Exhibition.

RULE 3.

All Stock exhibited must have been raised in the Province, and owned by the Exhibitor three months prior to the day of Exhibition.

RULE 4.

All articles must have been manufactured in the County, and owned by the Exhibitor, with the exception of Ploughs.

RULE 5.

In any case the Judges may withhold premiums if in their opinion, the articles exhibited be not judged worthy of the premium offered.

RULE 6.

Judges will be empowered to award special premiums on such articles not enumerated in the foregoing Catalogue, as they may consider worthy of such, said special premiums not to exceed in the whole the sum of £5 12s 6d.

RULE 7.

Twenty-five per cent out of all premiums will be withheld as subscriptions for the ensuing year.
