Resolved,—That a petition on behalf of this Board be presented to the Legislature at the next Session thereof, praying that the day named for holding the Parish elections for this County, may be changed to the first Monday in December, as established for other Counties in this Province.

Mr. Dibblee presented a petition from William Williams, of Woodstock, stating that in January last he took out Tavern Licence for one year, that he only sold for a few weeks, and then gave up the business; that he does not intend to sell any more, and prays that he may be allowed to surrender his Licence, and that the amount charged and paid for the half year between this Session and January next, may be paid back to him.

On motion ordered, That the prayer of the petition be granted, and the amount (£6 5s.) be refunded to him.

The Auditor presented Returns showing the state of the County Finances for several years separately, which Report was accepted and ordered to be entered on the Auditor's book,—and that it be published.

Ordered that James Clark be allowed 20s. for four days attendance on this Council.

Ordered that the Warden and Secretary Treasurer draw Cheques for the several accounts passed this Session.

The Council adjourned sine die.
