RULES FOR THE GUIDANCE OF MEMBERS.
No person shall be allowed to offer as his own, the property of another.
All Stock exhibited for premiums (Entires excepted, and which must have been owned at least one year by the competitor) must have been raised in the County; and all Stock exhibited that has not been raised by the competitor, must have been owned by him exclusively for not less than three months prior to the day of exhibition; and all Grain, Root Crops, or other article whatever exhibited, must have been grown or manufactured by the competitor, or directly under his superintendence, within the year in which such articles are exhibited; and all Manufacturers shall be perfectly new.
No person shall be allowed to exhibit any animal in a two-fold capacity, nor receive more than one premium on animals or articles of the same kind or class.
Arrangements will be made on the ground for the safe keeping of all animals exhibited, and halsters must be furnished by the owners.
Animals and articles for exhibition must be entered with the Secretary not later than the Saturday previous to the day of the Show, who will present each competitor with a numbered card corresponding to the entry in his book, which must be attached to the articles when exhibited.
All animals and articles for exhibition must be on the ground by 10 o'clock, A. M., when a Committee will be in attendance to assign to each its proper place, where it must remain till the close of the Exhibition.
The Committee are requested to be on the ground on the morning of the Show, by nine o'clock for making the necessary arrangements. The exhibition will open at ten o'clock.
Competent Judges will be appointed on morning of the Show, who will be at liberty to withhold any premium, if the animal or article be deficient in merit.
Should any member violate the rules of the Society, he will exclude himself from receiving any premium.
No person shall be allowed to interfere with the Judges in the discharge of their duties, nor meddle with any animal or article exhibited, nor remain in the place where the Exhibition is held, unless at the request of the Judges.

VERACITY IN PORTLAND.—Some of the people in Portland hold veracity at a great discount.—Some were found to make oaths that Neal Dow had purchased liquors for the purpose of sale contrary to law. Two others, one a publisher of the State of Maine, made oaths before a Justice that on the evening of the riot,—

Henry Carter, Judge of the Police Court of the City of Portland, appeared at the door of the City Agency, under the City Hall, after the citizens had been fired upon, and after the crowd had dispersed and made several inquiries as to whom the noble fellows were who fired,—saying he wished to know the names of the noble fellows, and rubbing his hands, triumphantly said, "Noble fellows! Noble fellows, too! they did it well."

Against this Judge Carter makes oath before a Justice that,—

I have only to say that the statement is utterly false in all its material allegations. I was not at the door of the City Agency during the evening—I was at home before there was any firing, and did not know that there had been any firing until after I had retired to bed, (when I was informed of it by one of my sons) and did not leave my house for the night.

The Argus and State of Maine, and liquor sympathizing papers generally in and out of the State, most grossly misrepresent the material circumstances connected with the riot. The Advertiser's account which we copy, is beyond doubt correct. The Editor of the Zion's Advocate, Portland says,—

The Advertiser's statements is the only reliable one. It was evidently written with much care, and gives a connected, clear and consistent account of the events. Neither of the other papers have tried to impeach its accuracy, and subsequent developments, so far as we learn, confirm it.

A fearful responsibility rests upon those men and presses which so grossly falsify and misrepresent facts, and get up riots for the wherewithal to make political capital against the Republican Party. Pray, what sort of a State Government should we have with such a man in power? Yet they say boldly and openly that their objects is "to obtain control in the State Government."—[Skowhegan Clarion.

A SAD PICTURE.—Mayor Hill, in an address delivered by him at a Temperance meeting in the Eastern District of Brooklyn, Tuesday evening, made the following statement; "More than three hundred illused wives have called upon me, since the first of January, to complain of their drunken husbands, who squandered all their money in rum, and left them without means of support." He estimated the total expenditure for rum in Brooklyn, during the course of a year, at near three millions of dollars.—[N. Y. Times.

The N. Y. Tribune in commenting on the Portland riot, says:

"It is a well known maxim, that in dealing with a mob, promptitude and severity are alone truly meritorious." No man can well estimate the benefit this City has derived from the two volleys fired at Astor-place, and we dare say the effect of this discharge in Portland will be equally wholesome.

A white man was recently tried at Frankfort, Ky., before two justices, for petty larceny, and sentenced to receive ten lashes. The sentence was carried into effect, and he brought a suit for damages in the Circuit Court, and recovered \$500—\$300 against the constable and one of the justices, and \$200 against the justice.

Tom Thumb, the celebrated little great man, was married at Webster, on Thursday last, to a Miss Vinton, of Bridgeport, Connecticut.
