

## THE ARTIC SEARCH EXPEDITION.

The expedition to the Artic sea in search of Dr. Kane and his companions, sailed on its mission on Thursday last, May 31st, from the Brooklyn Navy Yard. It consisted of but two vessels—a bark called the Release, and the Arctic, a propeller. The bark was towed by her steam consort down the bay, receiving hearty cheers from every vessel that was passed on the way out of the harbor. They anchored on Thursday evening near Sandy Hook, and did not put to sea until Saturday. Friday, it will be remembered, is an auspicious day in the estimation of sailors.

Exactly two years previous to Thursday, Dr. Kane with a crew of sixteen men, sailed in the small bark Advance, in search of Sir John Franklin. His vessel was outfitted for a cruise of three years; and it was supposed that by means of hunting and fishing, the time might be lengthened a year more. Since July, 1853—six weeks after his departure—the adventurer has not yet been heard from. He is thought to have entered Smith's Sound and passed through to seek for the supposed open sea that lies beyond, where he imagined Franklin had gone. The winter following being one of great severity, the conjecture is that the Advance was frozen in so firmly that the summer did not free the bark from its prison of ice. It was the intention of Dr. Kane to leave a supply of provisions at Cape Alexander before entering the Sound; and if he has since been released from the icebergs, and has escaped, the fate of the voyager whom he sought to rescue, he is probably at this place at the present.—N. Y. Obs.

ST. JOHN SHIPS AGAIN.—We notice by a letter dated Melbourne, March 10th, the clipper ship "Mattias Cusino" has made the shortest run on record from Valparaiso to that port. The course was round Cape Horn, sailing eastward on the great circle principle.

The vessel about referred to is one of two clipper ships built in this place by Messrs. James Smith & Son, for the house of Messrs. Myres & Co. of Liverpool, and intended for the West Coast trade. We doubt not the sister ship "Biobio" now fitting out in Liverpool, will fully equal the Mattias Cusino.—New Brunswick.

COLONEL PRINCE AND HIS OFFER TO THE IMPERIAL AUTHORITIES.—The Windsor Herald reports Col. Prince as stating, during the ceremony of laying the corner stone of a new Court House at Sandwich had been responded to by the war office in the most flattering terms, and that he had recently received from Mr. Frederick Peel, secretary to Lord Panmure, the minister of war, a letter to that effect, and that his offer was under the consideration of the Imperial Government; and he earnestly hoped, and he believed that, ere long, he should find himself and his gallant fellows in the Crimea.—Canada Paper.

Boston harbour promises to be the scene of exciting aquatic sports on the 4th of July next, and we understand that a race gig, called the Neptune is going on from this City, to be rowed by mechanics, for the purpose of testing the amateur rowers from any part of the United States.—Ib.

FLOUR AND GRAIN BURNED.—The Rochester Union learns that on Thursday last, a warehouse at Port Hope, in Canada, containing 3000 barrels of flour, large quantities of grain and other produce was destroyed by fire, with all its contents. Some 300,000 feet of lumber were also burned at the same time.

GOOD NEWS.—The Pittsburg Chronicle predicts that the price of flour after harvest will be six dollars a barrel. In Maryland, South Carolina and Georgia the late rains revived the drooping hopes of the farmers and have given the suffering crops a start which will result in an unusually plenty harvest.

Five of the persons who were engaged in the Portland riot, have been bound over in the sum of \$500 each, to appear at the July term of the Supreme Judicial Court.

A proposition has been made in Europe to build a sub-marine tunnel from England to France across the channel!

The Buffalo Courier states that sixty shares of Niagara Suspension Bridge stock was sold a few days since, at 60 per cent. premium.

The British ship Sir Charles Napier, Pettingill, which sailed for Savannah from London, Jan. 11, has not since been heard from.

The Elective Legislative Council Bill has been negatived in the Canada Council by a vote of 14 to 8.

We are informed by a gentleman who resides on the Penobscot, that "within a few days, two millions of spruce deals were sold at St. John's to load four French ships to go to France, at ten dollars per thousand. This demand has grown out of the interruption of the Baltic trade, and must be interesting to dealers in that kind of lumber.—Kennebec Journal.

Recent California advices report flour to be worth \$10 per barrel at Yreka. A little more than two years ago flour was selling at the same place at \$100 to \$150 per barrel.
