Saving Grass Seeds.

Many farmers neglect to save their own gras seeds because it needs attention at a time whe they are most busy with their grain and hay; bu seed for their own use they would find their ac count in it, both in prime cost, and in not bein man's farm, who had no interest in keeping you land free of weeds.

Orchard Grass is among the first to ripen, an will be ready to cut from the 20th of June to the first of July, according to location and soil. Th should be either reaped or cradeled and immed ately put in compact shocks to stand a couple weeks. The stubble may then be mowed as hayed, taking care not to disturb the shock When dry, the shocks should be moved very car fully to the barn for storage, as the seed she out easily.

Kentucky Blue Grass comes in season for ha vest about the same time as orchard grass. T best method of gathering the seed of this grass by stripping the heads by hand; the process rather slow, but no other way will bring the se in good condition, as it is too light and chaffy be threshed and winnowed. At the price for whi it sells in market, even the slow way pays well

Meadow Fescue (English Blue Grass) is ri early in July, and having a tolerably heavy secan be cut by the sickle or cradle, and when d threshed and winnowed carefully to separate chaff.

Foul Meadow Grass ripens its seed in the l of July. We consider this as the best grass can be raised for meadow swails and marsh lan It is fine, nutritious and yields a great burde and-like a good natured wife-will bear a gr deal of neglect without spoiling. When in he this grass very nearly resembles red top and often mistaken for it. The seed is very fine d sells at a high price—as much by the bushel clover seed, though much lighter,

Timothy seed ripens in July, and as it is c tained in strong heads, is very easily harves and got out, either by reaping, cradling, or such a machine as Wagnor's clover harve simply taking off the heads. We wish to besp the attention of farmers generally to saving best seeds of these leading grasses .- Ohio C
