

PARIS.—We learn from an excellent source that the government are in daily expectation of receiving news of a serious encounter, perhaps a pitched battle, between the Russians and Turks at Silistria the latter reinforced by French and English troops, who are already on their way to the spot. Marshal de St. Arnaud who is said to have been appointed generalissimo, will command the French and Turkish armies on the field. Omar Pasha had marched to the relief of Silistria; and it is to be hoped that the Turks do not think of abandoning it until the reinforcements come up. It is said very confidently that the Austrians have very probably by this time entered Little Wallachia. Nothing can be better than the conduct of Austria, but from more quarters than one Prussia is not spoken of in so favourable a manner. The government are anxious and uneasy about Prussia: they know that at Berlin Russia is working heaven and earth to detach the King from the allied powers, and for the last day or two there appear symptoms of hesitation and vacillation on the part of his Majesty. In fact one despatch speaks of a crisis, not merely ministerial, but more generally political. This crisis will probably end as the previous ones, but still it is sufficient to diminish the satisfaction felt on account of Austria.

The Montreal Sun, speaking of the Printers' strike in Toronto, says:

The printers employed in the daily offices of Toronto have struck for higher wages. They have been receiving 1s. 4d. per 1000 ems, and 4d per hour additional for night work; they now demand 1s. 6. per thousand ems, and 6d. per hour additional for work done at night. The employers have held a meeting, and drawn up a scale of prices, which they offer, and which they say they are determined to stand by at all hazards. The employers offer 1s. 7d. per 1000 ems in daily offices, and 1s. 5d. in offices where there is no night work—knocking off the bonus of so much per hour for work done after six o'clock. This latter document is signed by representatives of all the respectable printing establishments, with the exception of the Patriot. The rates offered are much higher than those paid in Montreal, and as living is much cheaper in Toronto than in our city, we are of opinion that the employers' offer is a very fair one indeed.

The London correspondent of the New York Commercial Advertiser, under date of the 13th June, writes:—

The reports from the Turkish army on the Danube continue to give evidence of skill and courage such as have never been exceeded in any war.—The discomfiture of the Russians before Silistria is ascertained to have been attended with a degree of havoc, that would probably have caused any Government not utterly reckless of the lives of its subjects to pause and negotiate for terms. On the opposite side of the river also their disasters seem to have been of nearly equal magnitude, and accounts are current of whole battalions being cut off with hardly the escape of a tenth of their number.—Taking the loss of life that has occurred during the present war on both sides from wounds and disease together, it is believed to have exceeded the results of any campaign in history, except those which have been attended by some sudden action of the elements, as in the case of the destruction of the army of Senacharib, or that of Napoleon at Moscow. During merely the first week of their operations before Silistria the Russians are positively affirmed to have lost 8000 men.

PIRATES IN THE MEDITERRANEAN.—In consequence of the increasing number of pirates in the Levant, the United States Consul at Malta recommends all merchant vessels coming to the Mediterranean to have the crew supplied with Colt revolvers, and during the voyage to practice the crews in their use; also a few of the long American rifles, so that they can fire at any suspicious boats previous to their getting too close; and if this is carried out, each merchant vessel will be able to protect herself from pirates, which in most cases arises from want of due caution, and want of proper guards.—London Globe, June 7.

When the great Napoleon used to beat the Russians in pitched battles, and there was no mistake about it, the Russians always sang *Te Deum* as if they had won victories. Napoleon, when he heard of this, said, "The Russians are great rogues; they not only lie to man, but they lie also to God."

SUDDEN DEATH BY LIGHTNING.—On Friday evening, the 23rd instant, as a respectable farmer of the name of Archibald Campbell, Junr., of South Georgetown was sitting with his wife by his side, inside of his house, he was struck by lightning and killed on the spot. His wife escaped unhurt,

A paragraph in the report of the Atlantic's news says that the Russians are fortifying Jassy. A sign of apprehension as to the hostility of Austria Jassy is a large town in Moldavia between the rivers Szereh and Pruth, and on a branch of the latter stream.

It is said that Capt. Giffard, of the Tiger, stranded near Sebastopole; shot the Greek Pilot dead the moment that the vessel ran on shore.

A female was arrested by the Police on Saturday evening for brutal treatment of one of her children. The offender lived on Duke St., and her child, a fine boy seven years old, was found with its hands and feet bound together, a cord drawn lightly around its neck and a deep gash in its upper lip. The case will be investigated this morning at the Police Office.—The Globe.

Yesterday we were called upon to witness an extraordinary operation performed by Dr. Dow at his Rooms, in the removal of a great fleshy tumour from the shoulder of a man named Collins, who in consequence of its size, had to carry it for a long time past in a bag made for the purpose. Dr Dow after placing the subject under the influence of Chloroform, performed the operation of severing the tumour in the short space of three minutes.—The arteries were taken up, and the skin connected in a few moments afterwards. During the whole time Mr. Collins, although not wholly insensible, did not complain of pain; although he once or twice desired those present not to scratch his shoulder. The tumour weighed eleven pounds.—New Brunswick Reporter, June 23.

AN INFERNAL MACHINE—TWO PERSONS DREADFULLY MANGLED.—Last Tuesday evening a box was sent to the Marine Hospital, Cincinnati, corner of Longworth and Western Row, and deposited in the room of the Steward, Mr. J. H. Allison.—About ten o'clock the Steward and his wife being alone in the room, opened the box, when it exploded, mangling the bodies of both horribly. Mrs. Allison had both her arms blown off, and skull fractured. Mr. Allison was dreadfully mangled. The furniture, windows and ceiling of the room were shattered to atoms. Indications are, that the box contained a bomb shell, about six inches in diameter.

No clue has yet been obtained to the perpetrator of the fiendish act.
