THE NOVA SCOTIA RAILWAY.—The members of the Nova Scotia Legislature had a ride out of Halifax last week, and dined at the Four Mile House. Everything appears to be going on well there, while in this Province we are standing still. We are told that there is not now a single man at work on the railway from this City to Shediac, and that all work has been suspended for a month past!

The Railway Commissioners at Halifax have let out about two miles of the road in small jobs in order to furnish work to all the unemployed labourers in about Halifax. Every able man can get work there at three shillings and sixpence per day. Would that all our labouring people in this City had the like chance. Why is it not so? Who is to blame?—N. Brkr.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Mr. Daniel Nicholas, well known to many in St. John, as a pious citizen, and to the Baptist Churches here, as a worthy and consistent Christian; while carrying wood into his house on Tuesday morning, fell down and died. Mr. Nicholas was a native of England, and came here many years ago. He leaves behind him a widow, to whom we yield our heart felt sympathy, in this sudden and mournful bereavement.—Visitor.

TRADE BETWEEN BOSTON AND THE CANADAS.—The new and highly important railroad from the city of Prescott, (opposite Odensburg) to Ottoway City, (recently called Bytown) is at last finished and in full operation, from Odensburg to Ottawa, a distance of 54 miles. Regular passenger trains carrying the mails are now running in connection with the Odensburg road, and doing better business already, in this dull period of the year, than was predicted for it by its most sanguine friends. In the coming spring, particularly after the Reciprocity treaty goes into operation, the interchange of freight and passengers by the Canadians and New Englanders will undoubtedly be very large. The upper line of northern roads may now truly say that 54 miles of railroad have been added to their previous length and usefulness.—Boston Courier.

RETURN OF DUTIES UNDER THE RECIPROcity TREATY.—The Committee on Commerce in the House of Representatives at Washington, have reported a bill for refunding the duties collected on certain imports from these Provinces, since the several dates at which each Province gave effect to the Reciprocity Treaty. This bill has been read twice, and referred to the Committee of the whole.—The Boston Courier of the 5th says, there is no doubt the bill will pass at the present Session of Congress.

It will be remembered, that a Treasury Order was issued on the 15th October last, relative to the admission of British caught fish into the United States, from all the Colonies, under an arrangement effected by M. H. Perley, Esq., of this City, which provided for the issue of debenture certificates for the amount of duty paid. On the 4th November following, Mr. Perley also effected an arrangement for the admission of the products of New Brunswick into the United States, on the same terms as Colonial fish, the Legislature of this Province having the day previously passed the Act for carrying out the Reciprocity Treaty.

Under the bill now before Congress, and which it is said will certainly pass, all duties paid on Colonial fish since 10th October, and on New-Brunswick produce since the 4th November last, will be refunded so soon as the Reciprocity Treaty is in full force. A short Act of Parliament is alone required to give full effect to the Treaty and this is expected by the next mail from England, Lord Elgin having undertaken to get the necessary bill through Parliament with the least possible delay.—Courier.

We learn from the Westmorland Times that meetings have recently been held at the Bend to take measures to obtain an Act of Incorporation. It is proposed to call the town "Monkton"—to be divided into three wards; the Town Council to consist of a Mayor and Six Councillors—the Mayor to be elected from the wards. An assessor for each ward to be elected annually. All elections to be by ballot. Widows and spinners to be entitled to vote on freehold property. All male inhabitants born within the limits prescribed by the charter, and all persons who may have served an apprenticeship of four years, to be entitled to their freedom at the age of twenty-one, on payment of fees of office. A resident of two years, on payment of £1 and fees of office, to entitle the party to his freedom. All others to pay £3 and fees of office.—Freedom only to be allowed to transact business in this City.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 1.—Steamboat Accident Thirty lives lost.—The steamer Eliza sunk a few days since in the Mississippi River, at Plum Point Bend, a little below Memphis. It is feared that thirty lives were lost.
