The resolution was ably sustained by His Honor the Speaker, Hon. Mr. Smith, Honorable Attorney and Solicitor Generals, Messrs. Steadman, McPherson, McPhelim, End, and others—And opposed by Hon. Provincial Secretary, Messrs. McLeod, English, and others.
