Mr. Gallop presented a petition from the Trustees of Schools for the Parish of Wakefield, asking that a Warrant be issued to assess School District No. 3 in said Parish, in the sum of £30 to build a School House in said District, and also £22 to pay Teacher for one year.

On motion ordered, That a Warrant be issued accordingly.

Mr. Carville presented a petition from the Trustees of Schools for the Parish of Simonds, asking that a Warrant be issued to assess School District No. 6, or what is termed Presq' Isle District, for £15—£14 of which to support the Teacher, and £1 for wood—to be collected in the month of October next.

On motion ordered, That a Warrant be issued on the production of the necessary certificate of a public meeting having been held for that purpose.

Mr. Grey moved, seconded by Mr. Lloyd—

Whereas the Law requires that every Parish officer elected or appointed and notified, shall within six days thereafter make oath before a Justice to fulfil the duties of his office, and such Justice shall give notice thereof to the Clerk of the Peace; And whereas many persons elected or appointed do not make the necessary oath, the consequence of which is their duties are carelessly performed, and in some instances entirely neglected, and it frequently happens that Justices neglect to give such notice to the Clerk of the Peace, so that it is difficult to ascertain what officers have taken the oath—therefore

Resolved, That every Parish Officer elected or appointed in this County after the first day of January, 1856, upon six days' notice being given by the Parish Clerk's posting up lists of the officers so appointed in three or more public places in their respective parishes, make oath before a Justice to fulfil the duties of his office, and at the same time obtain a certificate from the Justice that he has taken the oath, which certificate he shall deposit with the Secretary-Treasurer; and any person elected or appointed to an office refusing or neglecting to make the necessary oath, or perform the duties of the office, shall for each and every offence forfeit forty shillings; and if such person be a Parish Clerk he shall forfeit for each offence five pounds; and that a Bye-Law be prepared to carry out this Resolution—Carried.

On motion of Mr. Sharp, seconded by Mr. Grey—

Resolved, That the Secretary-Treasurer be instructed to call upon John Bedell, Esq, for £3 14s 3d—the amount placed in his hands for collection by John A. Shea, Collector for the Parish of Northampton for 1853—Carried.

On motion the Council adjourned until 10 o'clock, A. M., to-morrow.
