One-eighth of an acre to be ploughed by each competitor.

A Special Premium of one penny per lb., will be paid upon all Northern Clover Seed grown within the County the present year, under the regulations attached to the offer of the same premium for Clover Seed grown in 1854.

Rules for Guidance of Competitors.

1.- None but Members will be allowed to

2.- Any article exhibited must be the property of the person in whose name it is exhibited.

3.-All Grain, Root Crops, and Manufactures exhibited, must be the production of this County the present year. All Stock except Breeding Animals, must have been raised in this County .-Animals for the purpose of breeding must have been owned and kept within the County at least four months previous to the Show.

4.—No Animal that has taken a Premium at any previous Show of the Society will be allowed to compete in the same character. No animal will be allowed to compete in more than one character.

5.—Applicants for Premiums upon Farm Crops must exhibit an average sample of one bushel at the Show; and must on or before the first day of December, furnish the Secretary with a statement of the amount raised upon the specified quantity of land; which statement must be sworn to by himself and another credible person. In order to insure perfect fairness in ascertaining these points with respect to Root Crops, the Society will appoint an Agent who will, when called upon by a Competitor, join him in measuring the land and ascertaining the amount of the crop.

6.-No Competitor will be allowed to receive more than one Premium upon articles of the same kind or character.

7 .- Articles for Exhibition must be entered with the Secretary not later than the Thursday next previous to the day of the Show, who will present each Competitor with a numbered Card O corresponding to the entry in his Book, which must be attached to the article exhibited, and the premiums will be awarded to the respective num-

8 .- Cattle Pens and other arrangements suitable for the purpose, will be prepared previous to the day of Exhibition, and halters or ropes must be furnished by the owners of Horses and Neat Stock, that they may be securely tied; a Committee will be present to assign their respective positions, as well as other articles for competition, wherein they must be placed by the parties in charge, and remain until the close of the exhibition. Stock must be on the ground by 9 o'clock, A. M.

9 .- Competitors will not be allowed the custody of any article exhibited, after being placed in the [Rules of Guidance continued on 6th page.]
