10.—Competent and impartial Judges will be selected, who will commence their examination at 10 1-2 o'clock, and their decision will be final, with respect to the merits of the article.

11.—The Judges will be at liberty to withhold any premium, if they consider the animal or article offered deficient in merit.

12.—Special Premiums will be awarded upon any article not provided for in the above list, if such are offered as the Judges shall consider worthy of encouragement.

Hay will be furnished by the Society for Stock exhibited for Premiums, and owned by Members residing at such a distance as to render it inconvenient to drive in the same on the morning of the Show.

Further regulations for the government of the Show on the day of Exhibition, as the law provides, will be published in due time.
