TERRIBLE RAILROAD ACOIDENT .- PHILADELPHIA, 17th .- A serious railroad accident occurred this morning near Fort Washington, on the Northern Pensylvania Railroad by the explosion of the boiler of the locomotive. The cars were filled with the teachers and children of St. Michael's Church Sunday school, bound on an excursion. The ears were set on fire and several lives were lost.

The accident occurred at 7 o'clock this morning. Rumor makes the killed from 60 to 200.

No train has arrived yet from the scene of accident. Other companies have furnished cars, and surgeons have been dispatched to aid the sufferers.

A despatch from Germantown says that numbers of the wounded have been brought there in private conveyance.

By latter accounts it appears there were 60 killed, mostly children.

STEAMER NORTHERN INDIANA DESTROYED BY FIRE. -Buffalo, 17th .- The steamer Northern Indiana took fire about 11 o'clock this morning, while on her voyage to Toledo, and burned to the water's edge .- Thirty to forty of the passengers are reported as being lost.

MILITARY .- On Saturday last, the Head Quarters of the 76th (Hindostan) Regiment arrived in the steamer Eastern State, direct from Halifax. Two companies marched to the barracks, and the other two proceeded to Fredericton in the evening. As the fine band proceeded through the streets, playing the popular tune of "Annie Laurie," a large crowd was attracted, who accompanied the gallant joy" from the afflicted. THE FIRE AR TORONTO .- The Toronto Globe states that when the fire broke out there were 300 persone at work in the manufactory of Jaques & Hay, and the flames rushed through the premises with such rapidity that seven persons were burned to better adapted for transportation. death, and four others badly injured in their attempt to escape. The dwelling of Mr. Jaques, and the brewery of Messrs. Carley & Nash, were also consumed. They were insured to the amount of \$6800. This does not cover much more than onefifth part of their loss.
