The British commanders were pushing forward The preparations for an expedition to Asia. Fort St. Paul has been mined. The weather in the Crismea continues to be very changeable. On the 17th there was a spring like mildness in the air ; on the following day the thermometer fell twenty degrees, and frost and sleet succeeded. Nevertheless, the health of the army continues to be excellent.

The British strength of all ranks in the Crimea is little short of 80,000 men, not one of whom is under 18 years of age, and but a small percentage can show much less than a year's military training at home and in the Crimea ; the cavalry in the Bosphoras amounts to nearly 5,000 ; there are 10,-000 men at Malta, in very fair condition, in reserve ; large draughts of field artillery leave Eng land within the next few hours ; the infantry regiments at home ready for service muster more than 12,000 men.
