How near is peace? The exact tenor of the answer returned by the Cabinet of St. Petersburg to the overture from Vienna must be known before this question can be answered. According to the telegraphic despatches from Vienna and Dresden, "Russia has merely conceded that "propositions forwarded by Austria ought to serve as the preliminaries of peace." We have reason to believe that the despatch from Paris, though not very clearly worded, approaches more nearly than those from Vienna and Dresden, to the terns of the message received by the English Government. Russia, we are given to understand, has only accepted the Austrian proposals as the basis of negociationss .--In like manner Russia accepted, last year, "the fifty six. four points ' as the basis of negociations. We do not mean to imply that the cases are exactly para-Hel. If we are to have Conferences in 1856 as we had in 1855, it is to be hoped that the allies will insist upon their being held in Paris or London instead of Vienna; or in Brussels, if it is deemed necessary that they be held once more in Vienna, England will be much more efficiently represented there than she was last year.
