Simonds, at Perkins' Corner, near Wheeler's;

Brighton, at or near Nevers', at mouth of Beckagumick;
Northampton, at John Shea's.

For the purpose of taking the said Poll; and I hereby further proclaim and give public notice that, on TUESDAY, the 17th day of June, inst., at the hour of twelve o'clock, noon, at the County Court House, aforesaid, the said Election will be closed, and the persons chosen to serve in the said General Assembly will be then and there openly declared; of all of which said Proclamations all persons will take due notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

To the Electors of the County of Carleton.

GENTLEMEN: information has been received that the Executive Council, the advisers of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, have resigned, and only hold office until a new Administration be formed. It is reported that the reason of such resignation is, that the Lieutenant Governor decided to dissolve the House of Assembly, contrary to the advice of his constitutional advisers. That the Governor has the power to exercise this prerogative, no one will dispute; but the expediency of exercising it in opposition to the advice of his Council will, I believe, be generally condemned. The present Government assumed office on the principle of Responsible Government; which principle means that, while the Administration remain in power, the Governor is bound to conduct the Government according to their advice.

The present Government, in resigning, have acted in a manner that, I think, will be approved of throughout the Province. The question now to be settled is, Shall a Governor, sent among us as a stranger, whose only interest is the salary he receives from the taxes of the people, rule or an Administration, formed from the representatives of the people, who are responsible for all their acts, and acquainted with the wants of the country?

The principle of arbitrary rule by a Governor, and of a Government by the people of this Province, is now to be tried. I observe that the Lord Bishop of Fredericton has headed a Petition, advising the Governor to dissolve the House. I will only ask the Electors of Carleton whether they will submit to such a course of action—to be ruled by a Governor who listens to the advice of irresponsible men; or whether they will teach the Head of the Government of this Province that they wish to be governed by a body of gentlemen, selected to form an Administration, from those elected by the constituency of New Brunswick for that purpose. My mind on this subject has been made up long ago. As the Election will, likely, soon take place, I shall, all being well, appear at the Hustings as a candidate for your suffrages. On this occasion, if you vote for me, you must distinctly understand that I disapprove of the course pursued by the Governor, in the violation of the Constitution of our country; and that it is my conclusion his services in this Province can, for the future, be of little value to the people. Further, I make no promises nor pledges. My past conduct in the Legislature must be the guarantee for the future. Whoever you elect, I hope, will be united and determined to consolidate the principle of self-government; so that, in the future, those principles of constitutional government shall be fully established, and handed down to your children in all their integrity.
