

CENTRAL AMERICA AFFAIRS.—The Washington correspondent of the New York Herald says—"It is true that the French and English squadrons contemplate interfering in the Central American War if the assertion of a distinguished foreign minister, who ought to know, is to be believed."

It is also stated that Walker, who has played such an important part in the affairs of Nicaragua has made an attack on Costa Rica, an adjoining Province, and that his filibusters have been handsomely beaten.

The Canadian Assembly have decided by a vote of 64 to 56, that after 1859, the Provincial Parliament shall be permanently convened in the City of Quebec.

The Nova Scotia Assembly have voted £500 to Mr. Howe, as a public acknowledgement of his services in making arrangements for the sale of Provincial Debentures in London.

SNOW AND FROST IN CANADA.—The British Whig of Kingston, Canada, says—On the 19th inst. a good quantity of snow fell, succeeded on the 20th by the first thaw of the season. Since the 24th of December last until the 20th of March, the hard frost has been continued and perpetual, and not varied by a single hour's thaw! Should the present thaw continue for a full month it will scarcely take away all the snow off the ground.

THE COMMERCE OF THE WORLD.—The German Quarterly Magazine has an article on the World's marine, by which it appears that the waters of the earth are navigated by 145,000 vessels, of 12,904,687 tons. The United States have 5,500,000 tons of shipping, Great Britain 5,000,000, Germany, including Austria, 1,000,000, and France only 715,130, tons.

THE MAYORALTY.—The election for Mayor of this City is to take place the first Tuesday in May. We learn with pleasure that the Temperance body have determined to bring forward a candidate for this office, and we trust that the importance of sustaining the gentleman who shall be nominated by this body, will be duly considered by all friends of morality and Protestantism. The fact cannot be disguised, (however much interested parties may try to do,) that the great interest now at stake is Protestantism, although its opponents strike at it under another name. We trust that all true Protestants and Temperance men will see the importance of having the right man elected to the chief magistracy of this city—*Intelligencer*.

The English papers chronicle many failures among the grain merchants within the last two months.—In Glasgow, where the stock of grain was proportionably above that of any other place, there are reported thirteen cases of insolvency, involving liabilities to the extent of two millions of dollars.
