THE SEA OF AZOFF .- The following despatch from Sir E. Lyons, dated Nov. 18th, has been received at the Admiralty :-

Varna, 7.15 P. M .- Capt. Sherrard Osborne reports that on the 5th and 6th inst., a flotilla under his orders, in the Sea of Azoff, destroyed enormous quantities of grain and forage of this year's harvest, which was compactly stacked in six tiers, extending two miles along the coast, near Guciskliman, ready to be conveyed, partly to the Crimean army, after the formation of the ice in the Sea of Azoff, and partly to the army in the Caucasus, and which the enemy thought secure from any naval attack. By the skilfullness of the arrangements, and the manner in which they were executed by Capt. Osborne, in which he was ably seconded by Commander Jno. P. Kennedy, the enterprise was effected in the most brilliant manner by landing on three points, under cover of the gun-boats of the allies, in the face of not less than 4,000 cavalry and infantry. Our loss amounted to only six wounded.

A letter from Erzeroum states that General Mou ravieff became insane in consequence of his defeat on the 29th of September, and that his staff had sent to Teffis for General Bebutoff, who refused to command.

TURKRY .- The following telegraphic despatch has been received from Vienna :-

Vienna, Wednesday Evening, Nov. 21.—Advices from Constantinople of the 12th and 15th inst., 195 have been received here.

A considerable number of the mutineer Tunisian | 198 soldiers have been condemned to death.

The Tunisian troops will be sent to Batoun and 201 Souchum Kale.

The Russians have plnndered a Kurdish village, and put all the inhabitants to death.

The health of the Turkish cavalry at Tuhurksu | 207 Charles Perley, is not good.

The Anglo-Turkish cavalry has gone to Kertch. Advices from Trebizonde of the 5th instant, say that during the last fortnight no news had reached Erzeroum from Kars.

Sir Allan McNab, premier of the Canadian Government, sued the Editor of the Hamilton Banner for libel. The verdict was in favour of the Editors, and Sir Allan gets only a lesson in policy for his pains.
