MAIL STAGE.

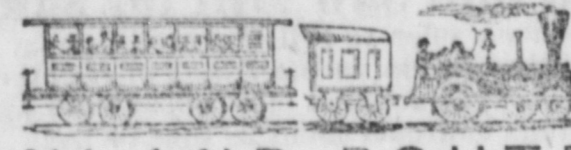
LEAVING Woodstock, at 8 o'clock, A. M., daily, Saturdays excepted, and Fredericton at the same hour, daily, Sundays excepted.
