First—The Census and other Statistics of 1851. It will be observed that the Province, with all its disadvantages, many of which were removed by the Treaty of 1854, has during the ten years ending in 1851, increased in a greater ratio than any of the adjoining States; and assuming it now to contain 223,000 inhabitants—a fair estimate of the present population—it has trebled in 31 years.—The other statistics are still more extraordinary, and give evidence of a people rapidly improving in all the elements of material progress.

Secondly—Perley's Hand Book, containing a compend of the History, Resources, and Institutions of the Province.

Thirdly—Professor Johnston's Report of the Agricultural capabilities of the Province.

This gives the opinion of a competent judge as to the capacity of the Province to produce wheat, grain of all kinds, and vegetables, and the results are contrasted with the products of other countries.

Fourthly—Perley's Report on the Fisheries.

Fifthly—An Abstract of the Imports and Exports and ships built the last ten years.

Sixthly—An Abstract of the Revenue for the last ten years.

Seventhly—A statement of the ungranted Lands held by the Government.

Eighthly—An Abstract of Expenditures on the Roads for the last ten years.

The above returns are all made for a period of ten years ending on the 31st December 1854, the materials for 1855 not being completed till the corresponding period this year.

AUSTRIA.—Vienna correspondence mentions that not only is the railway mania violent in Austria at present, but speculations have taken possession of all classes there, and it is credibly asserted that there inevitably must be a terrible smash if peace be not the result of the conferences.

A Vienna letter to the London Times says:—The evident desire of the Washington government to pick a quarrel with England, excites attention here, and the people in office are inclined to suspect the President of endeavoring to kill two birds with one stone.

In plain English, his partisans are believed to have two reasons for agitating against England, the one to secure the President's re-election, the other to make a diversion in favor of Russia. Austria is at present on very decent terms with the American government but she regards its continual endeavors to find a pretext for meddling with European affairs with such a jealous eye, that the good understanding is not likely to be of any great duration.

MR. GALLOP read a Bill to extend the Gaol Limits over the County of Carleton, accompanied by Petitions to the Legislature to that effect.
