

## THE PEACE CONFERENCE.

**PRESENTATION OF THE PLINIPOTENTIARIES TO THE EMPEROR NAPOLEON.**—The Emperor received on Monday several of the plenipotentiaries to the Conference which are about to be opened at Paris.—His Excellency the Count Von Buol Schaunstem, Minister of Foreign Affairs and of his Majesty the Emperor of Austria's Household; his Excellency the Count de Cavour, President of the Council of Ministers, and Minister of Finances of his Majesty the King of Sardinia; and his Excellency the Baron de Brunow, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of his Majesty the Emperor of the Russians,—were introduced successively to the Emperor by the Grand Master of the Ceremonies. The Conferences were to open yesterday (Saturday). The Plenipotentiaries walk and drive about Paris like ordinary mortals, leaving cards on each other and at the Tuileries, presenting their respects to Walewski, who invited them all to a grand concert at the Foreign office. The French Minister is the first to introduce harmony into a society which appears at first sight to be made up of discordant elements. The harmonious blacksmith must place them all on his anvil, and bang at them hard enough ere he will lick them into the shape so ardently desired by the Bourse jobbers.—Lord Cowley was with Count Walewski on Monday, and the old leaven of jealousy fermented at their meeting. M. Walewski proposed that Baron Brunow and Count Orloff should be seated beside him at the Council table of the Conferences. Lord Cowley maintained that the two places in question should be reserved for himself and Lord Clarendon, and ultimately gained his end, which perhaps, was not worth the expenditure of much diplomatic powder. The diplomatists are less reserved than usual in their intercourse with their friends. If speech be given to such personages for the concealment of their thoughts they have enveloped them in a goodly garb, as they talk loudly and earnestly and confidently with those who are thrown into their society. They talk about the weather, the new ballet, the improvements in Paris, French cookery and French opera dancers, they play at whist at the Union, to which they all have been elected honorary members during their stay in Paris; and lastly, talk confidently that peace will lie, like hope, at the bottom of their Pandora's box, which is to be opened. The English diplomatists assure their friends that no difference of opinion, even upon matters of detail exist between the French and English Cabinets on the points which are to be debated, but that both will cordially act together. The extreme earnestness with which they make their assurance engenders the suspicion that this country may possibly be rent in twain by some unfortunate suggestion or proposition at the Council table. The Russian diplomatists, who are of the Sphinx tribe, speak firmly enough. They say that they will not allow the question of indemnity even to be mooted; that the Western Powers chose to encourage Turkey in this contest, and that they must pay for their pleasure. Nor will Russia consent to reimburse Turkey any of the heavy expenditure caused by Prince Menschikoff's atrocious encroachment. The Russian Minister, Count Nesselrode, has also sent forth another circular to the Russian diplomatists, in which those points are insisted upon. It adds, moreover, that Russia will consent to no territorial changes beyond the alteration of the frontier line in Bessarabia.

The Pays suggests that it may perhaps not be thought essential to require from Russia such an extreme measure as the destruction of Nicolai and that it would suffice to interdict Russia from building in the arsenal of Nicolai any ship, frigate or vessel of war of any kind. The Pays also hints that the payment to Turkey of the expenses of the war may be compounded for by a "rectification" of the Asiatic frontier.
