

RUSSIAN SHIPS DESTROYED AT SEBASTOPOL.—The following is a statement of the Russian fleet at Sebastopol previous to the invasion of the Crimea by the Allies. It consisted of the following ships:—

Ships of the line.—Twelve Apostles, 120; Paris, 120; Three Saints, 120; Grand Duke Constantine, 120; Vladimir, 120; Sviatoslaw, 84; Three Hierarchies, 84; Tro-Sviatitia, 84; Varna, 84; Gabriel, 84; Empress Maria, 84; Tschesme, 68.

Frigates.—Cagul, 60; Kouleghi, 60; Kavarna, 60; Medea, 60.

Corvettes and Brigs.—Calypso, 18; Pylade, 18; Ptolemy, 20; Theseus, 20; Eneas, 20.

Smaller Vessels.—The Nearch, Streilla, Orlanda, Droluk, Ziabiaka, Lastorga, Smaglaga, 11 transports and 64 gun-boats.

Steamers, 12—6 large, and 6 small.—Among the first are the Vladimir, Bessarabia and Gromnostetz, which were remarkable for their power and the range of their guns.

In all, 108 sail, mounting 2200 guns.

CRIMEA, SEPT. 6.—The captain of frigate Hutehet de Cintre, commanding the Milan, has informed me that the Milan and Caton have destroyed in the Sea of Azoff, from Temalank to Dolga, forty-three fisheries, one hundred and twenty seven boats, some thousand nets, tar, salt and an immense quantity of casks. Four fisheries only have escaped destruction; the shallowness of the water did not allow our vessels to approach them. The damage done to the enemy may be estimated at some millions. The fishery trade in the Sea of Azoff gives rise to a considerable export trade, which extends to Poland. The destruction which has been done will render it impossible for this year. Commander Cloue of the Brandon, on his part, joined Captain Osborne of the Vesuvius, to send their boats up the Gulph of Oulouk, and to burn the provender collected there on the coast. All the commanders of our vessels congratulate themselves on being on so friendly a footing with Captain Osborne.

FRANCE.—Abd-el-Kader has recovered from his recent attack of illness, and has reached Paris. General Pelissier has been created Marshal of the Empire. The soldiers of the army of the east (class 47) are to be discharged immediately. A Te Deum is ordered to be celebrated in all the departments of the empire, for to-morrow, Sunday next. The Emperor has not left for St. Omer, as proposed, but will do so ere long. It has been announced in the Moniteur that a treaty of friendship and commerce was concluded at Teheran, on the 12th July last, between the Minister of France and Mirza Agha Khan, Chief Minister of the Shah of Persia. On the 14th the Shah ordered the ratification of the treaty. Paris was illuminated on Monday evening to celebrate the glorious victory obtained by the allied armies at Sebastopol. The ministers of the interior and of public worship have sent circulars to the prefects and bishops ordering the celebration of a Te Deum on the 16th instant, in all the departments of the empire. A rumour was current in Paris on Tuesday, that General Pelissier had telegraphed for instructions in case the Russians offered to capitulate, as he thought they would do. The answer was that Prince Gortschakoff must surrender at discretion and evacuate the whole of the Crimea, inflicting no damage on the fortifications and buildings still remaining in Sebastopol.

The committee of the Association of French Inventors has decided that the Minnie rifle shall in future be called the Delvigne Minnie rifle, M. Delvigne having declared that while he reserved to himself the priority of the invention, M. Minnie introduced improvements tantamount to original inventions, and was therefore entitled to the position accorded him.
