

PARTY GOVERNMENT.—It has long been matter of complaint in the Liberal constituencies that the principles of Party Government were not faithfully carried out—that the offices at the disposal of the party in power have not always been the reward of those who, in times which tried men's souls, bore the heat and burthen of the day. We believe the Liberals have too much cause to be dissatisfied. Marks of favor have over and over again been lavished on their adversaries by successive Liberal Administrations—and what good have they done? Conciliated the Opposition? Assuaged the bitterness of party feeling? Strengthened the Administration for the time being? Nothing of the sort. The Conservatives, while they accepted office at the hands of their opponents, despised the weakness which suggested the gift. Generous considerations and magnanimity are thrown away upon them, and their respect for the Liberals is at the highest possible point, when, instead of truckling to their enemies, they are doing justice to their own well tried friends and supporters. As for the Liberal party scattered over our eighteen Counties, their feeling has been one of mingled mortification and disgust. They have been weakened and all but demoralized, as a party, by the misdirected magnanimity of their Representatives; and we believe the last General Election would have turned out adversely to the interests of the Liberal Party, from this very cause if strong assurances had not been given that the future would atone for the past. Well, the House is about to assemble, and the country will soon see to what extent these pledges have been redeemed. The very first acts of the House itself—in the choice of its officers—will pretty plainly indicate the ruling policy of the next four years. If the principle of party is applied in the selection of those officers—and we can see no good reason why it should not—then we may fairly look forward to the carrying out of the same wholesome principle in every branch of the public service. But if not—if those at the head of affairs set the example of rewarding their enemies, and passing over their friends, then we take it the Liberal party will soon become a rope of sand and every one will feel himself absolved from party obligations.—*Novo Scotian.*

The Paris correspondent of the *Times* reports that at a reception at the Court of Vienna, on the 9th instant, the Emperor Francis Joseph declared to a member of the Diplomatic Corps that the moment had at last arrived to get out of the situation they were in one way or another: and to the Swedish Minister he observed that the treaty of his Government with France and England had produced the greatest effect at St. Petersburg, and would be powerful in hastening the termination of the crisis.

ESCAPE OF A FRENCH WHALER FROM THE RUSSIANS.—Letters from the Sandwich Islands state that a French whaler had been chased for two days in the neighbourhood of the Kuriles Islands by a Russian covette, which she escaped in a snow storm.

From the Minutes of the Municipal Council.

January 12th, 1856.

"MR. GALLOP read a Bill to extend the Gaol Limits over the County of Carleton, accompanied by Petitions to the Legislature to that effect.

"On motion—That the Bill and Petitions now introduced, meet the concurrence of this Board, and that the said Petitions be signed by the Warden and Secretary Treasurer, and presented at the next Session of the Legislature; and further

"Resolved, That the Bill and foregoing Resolution be published in the *Carleton Sentinel*."

AN ACT to enable the Municipal Council for the County of Carleton, to extend the Gaol Limits for the said County.

1. Be it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, That the Municipal Council for the County of Carleton, for the time being, shall have full power, by a Bye Law to enlarge the Gaol Limits for said County so as to include and extend over the whole of the said County, or such part thereof as the said Council by said Bye Law may define."

NEW BRUNSWICK.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

THE following was adopted as a Standing Rule in the Session of October, 1854:—

26th.—That no Bill of a private nature, or Petition for money or relief, shall be received by the House after the fourteenth day from the opening of the Session, both inclusive; and that the Clerk of this House do, one month previous to the meeting of the Legislature, cause fifty printed copies of this Rule to be sent to each of the Clerks of the Peace in the several Counties, for distribution, and cause the same to be inserted in the Royal Gazette, and two Newspapers in such Counties where Newspapers are published.
