

FRANCE.—*Latest*.—March 7.—The *Moniteur* contains an Imperial decree calling out for active service, 140,000 young soldiers for the class of 1855.

BERLIN, Sunday.—Two couriers passed through the city en route for Paris, bearing fresh instructions for the Russian Plenipotentiaries.

HAMBURG, March 6.—Admiral Watson has sailed from Kiel, and has ordered the fleet to assemble off Moar Island to announce the renewal of the blockade of the Russian ports.

LONDON, Friday evening.—The funds were heavy to-day. Owing to the continued pressure for money, advances on government securities were in active demand throughout the day at 6 per cent., the settlement day and transactions in scrip of the new loan having increased the wants of dealers.—Continental advices denote favorable appearance of exchange at all points.

MARSEILLES.—Orders are received here for the conveying of 10,000 infantry and a battery of artillery to the Crimea, to replace troops returned home.

BARTIC.—The Russians are sending troops in considerable numbers to Finland, concentrating a large force around St. Petersburg, and strengthening the batteries near Cronstadt.

ROYAL PRESENT TO THE TROOPS.—The Queen has sent to the commander of the forces ten portable boxes of a library for the use of the troops. These are trusted, by her Majesty's desire, to the honourable keeping of the soldiers, who will remember that loss or damage hurts their comrades' and their own good name. They will be distributed, in turn to each division.

The following resolution, of which Mr. A. A. Dorion has given notice, is likely to lead to an animated debate.—

Mr. A. A. Dorion.—On Wednesday, the 26th instant—For the reading of the Journals of this House of the 10th instant, containing an address of this House to His Excellency for a copy of the Charge delivered by the Hon. Judge Duval to the Jury, on the trial before the Criminal Court Quebec, in the month of February last, of *Kelly*, and others for the murder of *Edmond Corrigan*, and also for the Journals of the House of the 14th of March, instant, containing the Message of His Excellency, in order that he may move—

That the Administration in advising His Excellency to decline to comply with the prayer of the Address of this House of the 10th instant, gave advice calculated to interfere with the undoubted privileges of this House, and to disturb the good understanding between the Crown and this House, which it is of the highest importance to support and maintain.

Mr. J. B. E. Dorion has given notice that when Mr. Brown's representation by population resolution is taken up, he will move for the dissolution of the union.—*Canada Paper*.

THE RAILWAY MEASURES.—On Saturday morning last, the Railway bills finally passed the House of Assembly, and were immediately afterwards taken up to the Legislative Council by the Attorney General. We do not anticipate any serious difficulty in carrying them through the Second Branch; it will be strange, indeed, if a decision of so large a majority of the Representatives of the people should be reserved; but such a result cannot happen, and we look at the Bills as perfectly safe.—The Government have come out of this second trial with increased strength, and all hope of defeating them, in the present House of Assembly, is gone.—Well have they stood the shock, and nobly have they been sustained by the country! The experiment of a Liberal Government is now fairly working itself out, and we believe that no thing but extreme bad management on the part of the Liberals will ever allow the return of the old party to power.—*Courier*.

ASTOUNDING RUMOR.—The N. Y. Journal of Commerce has the following. The intelligence communicated by the shipowner, may be considered "important if true";—

A very respectable shipowner assured us several days since, that he was in possession of evidence going to prove that the government of President Walker, of Nicaragua, had been recognized by Great Britain, which had likewise concluded with his representative at the Court of St. James, a treaty consenting that the Mosquito territory be annexed to the Nicaragua Republic. We regarded the story as a piece of gossip, and did not publish it. The same gentleman reiterated the statement yesterday, and offered his personal responsibility for its truth; but we still think it probable that there is some mistake about the matter. We do not doubt the more than willingness of Great Britain to get rid of the Mosquitos in any honorable way; but we can hardly believe she would deem the method a feasible one. She would not like to play into the hands of American filibusters.

The following resolution is to be brought into Parliament by Mr. Brown during the present week:—

"Resolved,—That the separating line between Upper and Lower Canada, so far as regards Parliamentary Representation, ought to be abolished; that all sections of the United Province should be placed on an equal footing; and that population should be adopted as the basis of Representation in the Provincial Parliament."

POLAND.—The deliberations which have taken place in Russia relative to the proposed reorganization of the kingdom of Poland closely interests Prussia, and national feelings in the Grand Duchy of Posen have been much excited. The Prussian government has, therefore, applied directly to Russia for explanations as to its intentions with regard to Poland, in order to judge of what measures it may be necessary to take in the Duchy Posen.
