

**THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.**—This document does not appear to have excited any such sensation in England, as it was evidently intended to call forth. The London *Times* speaks of it very favourably, and has a quiet chuckle over the good sense displayed by the President, in promulgating his message without leaving the ground to be pre-occupied in the Congress itself by a mass of adverse criticism. The *Thunderer* also declares that there can be nothing but mutual respect between the two nations, and that the statesmen of both countries will leave nothing undone to arrange differences, without a sacrifice of honor on either side. In regard to the recruitment question, the *Times* says:—

"The whole affair was stopped before any mischief was done; and, what is more, reparation was made—reparation that would be thought ten times more than sufficient by the dignified courts of the older world. On this side of the Atlantic, when a mistake has been made an apology is offered; and to reject that apology, and demand some fanciful compensation for the supposed wrong, is always set down to the sensitive jealousy of the man who has his character and position still to make. In fact, a readiness to accept an apology is here thought quite as much the mark of a gentleman, nay, more so, than a quickness to resent an indignity. Every fellow has the latter, but it is only the gentleman who has the former. We are sure that there is not a society of gentlemen in Europe who would not think a sufficient reparation done in this instance, when the wrong had been stopped even before actual accomplishment, and its impropriety admitted. What more President Pierce requires he does not in his message, but as the direct bearing of the United States' law on the point is now admitted, and there is no chance of a British enlistment being again attempted in the Union, any further 'reparation' demanded by the United States' government must be something more than the vindication of its honour, respect for its neutrality, and obedience to its laws. It is a matter on which we conceive the British Government will be guided by precedent. It will deal with the United States as it would with France or any other European Court; and if, notwithstanding, the United States should demand more, the people of this country will not submit to undeserved and gratuitous humiliation."

**THE HAYTIAN INVADING ARMY AGAIN IN MOTION.**—*New-York, Feb. 9.*—A private letter from Hayti, dated January 25, says that the Haytian Army has advanced to Onnaminthe and that all the troops are being collected to continue the invasion; that most vigorous measures were in force to augment the army, the people being caught up and put in prison until they are ready to be sent off.

The Steamer *Persia*, at New York from Liverpool, encountered considerable field ice in lat. 46, long. 46, and was detained thirty-six hours in it. She sustained some damage from it. We believe it is very unusual to meet with ice in the Atlantic at this season of the year, and its prevalence may account for the detention of the Pacific.—*Cour.*

January 12th, 1856.  
MR. GALLOP read a Bill to extend the Gaol Limits over the County of Carleton, accompanied by Petitions to the Legislature to that effect.

"On motion—  
Resolved, That the Bill and Petitions now introduced, meet the concurrence of this Board, and that the said Petitions be signed by the Warden and Secretary Treasurer, and presented at the next Session of the Legislature; and further

"Resolved, That the Bill and foregoing Resolution be published in the Carleton Sentinel."

AN ACT to enable the Municipal Council for the County of Carleton, to extend the Gaol Limits for the said County.

1. Be it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, That the Municipal Council for said County of Carleton, for the time being, shall have full power, by a Bye Law to enlarge the Gaol Limits for said County so as to include and extend over the whole of the said County, or such part thereof as the said Council by said Bye Law may define.

#### NEW BRUNSWICK.

#### HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

THE following was adopted as a Standing Rule in the Session of October, 1854:—

26th.—That no Bill of a private nature, or Petition for money or relief, shall be received by the House after the fourteenth day from the opening of the Session, both inclusive; and that the Clerk of this House do, one month previous to the meeting of the Legislature, cause fifty printed copies of this Rule to be sent to each of the Clerks of the Peace in the several Counties, for distribution, and cause the same to be inserted in the Royal Gazette, and two Newspapers in such Counties where Newspapers are published.
