From the Minutes of the Municipal Council.

January 12th, 1856.

MR. GALLOP read a Bill to extend the Gaol Limits over the County of Carleton, accompanied by Petitions to the Legislature to that effect.

"On motion—
Resolved, That the Bill and Petitions now introduced, meet the concurrence of this Council, and that the said Petitions be signed by the Warden and Secretary Treasurer, and presented at the next Session of the Legislature; and further
Resolved, That the Bill and foregoing Resolution be published in the *Carleton Sentinel*."

AN ACT to enable the Municipal Council for the County of Carleton, to extend the Gaol Limits for the said County.

1. Be it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, That the Municipal Council for said County of Carleton, for the time being, shall have full power, by a Bye Law to enlarge the Gaol Limits for said County so as to include and extend over the whole of the said County, or such part thereof as the said Council by said Bye Law may define.
