ARRIVAL OF THE PERSIA.

New York, November 25.

Persia arrived. No steamer had arrived at Liverpool since Niagara sailed.

English money market more stringent. Rates of Bank of England advanced to 7 per cent. Consols 92 1/2 to 92 3/4. The dearth of money severely felt at Manchester.

Markets generally dull; little doing in cotton. Breadstuffs exhibit decline on the week. Flour, Is.; Wheat, 3d.; Corn unchanged.

Severe gale at Liverpool on the 12th, by which several vessels were driven on shore, including American ships, Saml. Fox, Louisiana, and Silas Wright. No lives lost.

General news devoid of any special interest.

TIMBER AND DEAL TRADE.

(From Farnworth & Jardine's Circular.)

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 6.—The supply of Colonial Timber and Deals in the past fortnight shows some excess compared with same period last year. Consumption for the past month has been very languid, especially when compared with the two previous months.

ST. JOHN PINE.—The best quality is readily disposed of at full rates, 1s. 11d. a 2s. for 18 inch average, while wood of middling quality is difficult of sale.

HARDWOOD continues in demand, and large sized wood, if of good quality, commands full price—1s. 6d. a 1s. 10d., for St. John.

SPRUCE AND PINE DEALS.—Large supplies in the past month, diminished consumption, and the high value of money, have prejudicially affected Deals. The recent sales, by private contract, show a depreciation in the value of 10s. to 15s. per standard upon the rates current at the close of September.—By auction, yesterday, part of the cargoes per "General Newell," "Elizabeth," and "Florida," were sold, and averaged for Spruce Deals about £9 7s. 6d., and for Pine Deals about £9 10s. per standard.

LATHWOOD.—Quebec 4 feet Lathwood has sold at 120s., and St. John at 100s. to 120s. per fathom; with cargo the rates have been 40s. to 60s.

RAILWAY SLEEPERS are seldom imported now, except specially ordered; 9 feet 10 x 5 are worth 3s. 6d. to 4s. each.

PALINGS AND LATHS.—Palings have been sold at 55s. to 60s., and Laths at 12s. 6d. per M.

From Edmiston & Mitchell's Price Current.

The arrivals into Clyde, from British North America, during the month, have been by thirty eight vessels, registering 24,212 tons, comprising 19 from Quebec, 12 from St. John N. B., and 7 from other ports. For the corresponding period last year, the tonnage employed was 5,628.

WHITE PINE.—Several cargoes of Quebec have been sold, by auction, at 17d. to 17 1/2d. for 60 feet and 18d. to 18 1/2d. for 65 to 70 feet average; and 240 logs Miramichi brought 17d. per foot. Of St. John, 5 cargoes have been sold at auction—1 of 18 1/2 inch (ex derelict ship Moro Castle), at an average of 21 1/2d.; 1 of 19 inch at 2s. 1d.; and 1 of 20 inch at 2s. 3d. per foot; 2 cargoes of 16 1/2 and 17 inch, averaged 18 1/2d. to 19 1/2d. per foot, in Glasgow.

BIRCH.—228 logs Shediak brought an average of 15 1/2d. per foot, at auction.

DEALS AND BATTENS.—A cargo of St. John Spruce 1st. 2d. and 3d quality, was sold, with invoice to arrive in Glasgow, at £5 1s. 3d. freight. A cargo of Windsor deals brought 13 1/2d. per foot, in Glasgow. Two cargoes of Shediak Deals averaged 13d. per cubic foot, at auction, in Greenock. Part of a cargo of 3d quality floated Pine Deals brought 13 1/2d. per cubic foot, at auction. Battens 7 by 2 1/2 bring 1 1/2d. to 1 3/4d. per lineal foot.

LATHWOOD.—Hemlock brings £6 to £7 per fathom of 4 feet.

PALINGS.—Bring 55s. to 60s. per 1,000 pieces of 4 1/2 feet, in Glasgow.

THE MONEY MARKET.—Consols for Money 92 1/2. BREADSTUFFS had slightly declined.

FREIGHTS.—Bars, rails, and fine iron, Boston, 17s. 6d. to 20s.; New York, 10s. to 11s.; Philadelphia, 20s. to 22s.; New Orleans, 12s. 6d.

The Ice, which for several days has been making on the river, ceased running here on Monday last, and has now the appearance—although the weather is fine—of remaining stationary for the season. The steamers plied to Fredericton as long as possible, and as late as Wednesday they discharged cargoes in Sheffield.—Reporter.

The registration fees on Registered letters passing through the English post, yield a revenue of £23,000 per annum.

The popular majority against Buchanan in the Free States is more than four hundred thousand votes. This is prodigious, and yet by the working of our political system, it is neutralized and the minority vote made to tell against us in a contest where the only contending parties is the free and slave States. It is only nominally that the party in free States opposed to the extension of slavery is beaten. Really they have an immense preponderance of the popular vote on the only ground where the battle could be fought. The following table exhibits an approximation to the majorities against Buchanan in the Free States:—

The votes of the three Northern States of New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Indiana, whose electoral vote is given to Buchanan, are pretty equally divided, so that the above aggregate will not be sensibly diminished by them.

We (Boston Anglo Saxon,) give the following from a private letter recently received by us from London.

"Our Ministers have conceded to France all the rights and privileges of our Newfoundland Fisheries."

These privileges thus given up to the French are probably of the same nature as those given up to the United States under the Reciprocity Treaty.

ACCIDENT IN RESTIGOUCHE COUNTY.—The correspondent of the Miramichi Gleaner, writing from Dalhousie, under date of Nov. 13th, says that a fatal accident occurred near that place on the Saturday night previous, by the upsetting of a cart, which caused the death of the owner, named Chas. Murchy.

SNOW AT THE WEST.—On the 31st October snow fell in Hornellsville N. Y., Oswego, Washington, Philadelphia, Albany, Baltimore; in some of these places the snow was several inches in depth, and the ice formed to a considerable thickness. Let the grumblers about the cold and snow in this Province hide their diminished heads.

H. B. M. Government has presented a gold chronometer to Capt. Champion, of the U. S. Packet Ship Victoria, as a token of their sense of his meritorious conduct towards the crew of the British barque Rose.

THE RAILWAY.—We perceive by the hand-bills posted about the City, that the Contractors require several hundred men immediately, to commence operations at this end of the line. Tenders are advertised for, for Grading and Masonry, of the Railway between the third mile stake and the nine-mile house. Between Saint John and the third mile stake, the line will be completed forthwith, so as to convey workmen and materials hence to the works. We are happy to be able to record this fresh advance towards the completion of a Railway in the Province. We have from time to time stated the progress of the works, and shall continue to do so. We have never endeavored to conceal or mistake that progress; and we leave to others the task, for which they are far more able than ourselves, of "humbugging," (we borrow the elegance from the Government organ) the people into the belief that something extraordinary is being done.—Cour.

DESTRUCTIVE FLOOD IN INDIA.—Loss of over Four Thousand Lives.—The Calcutta correspondent of the London Times, under date of Oct. 4 gives the following account of a disastrous freshet in that country:

"The rain this year has been universally severe. The downpour in Afghanistan was unprecedented, and in August its effects began to be visible. The torrent of water which at this season rolls down the water system of the Indus gradually increased, then overtopped the banks, and then burst on the plains with a force that swept whole towns from the face of the earth. The cantonment of Naoshera only half built, was carried away. The great cantonment of Dehar-Gahzee Khan was totally ruined, the sun-burnt bricks of the building melted in the flood. The bund or dyke which defends Leia burst, and Leia has disappeared. The loss of life has not been in proportion, 4000 or 5000 villagers not counting for much in India, but the destruction of property is incalculable.

SPLENDID TEMPLE.—The Masonic fraternity of New York State contemplate erecting in the city of New York an edifice which will exceed in magnificence anything of the kind on this continent.—It is to be five stories high, of white marble, 100 feet front by 135 deep. It will contain ample accommodation for all masonic purposes, and appointments and decorations of the rooms will be on the most splendid and costly scale. The Masonic Temple in Philadelphia, which is a wonder for beauty and magnificence, cost \$300,000, but this edifice is to cost \$500,000.
