ARRIVAL OF THE CIRCASSIAN.

St. John's, Newfoundland, July 22

The steamer *Circassian*, Capt. Powell, from Li-
verpool, on the 11th inst., arrived at half-past four
o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, 22nd inst.

The steamship *Asia*, for New York, sailed from
Liverpool on the same day that the *Circassian* left.

A slave vessel named the *Adams Gray*, of New
York, has been captured and condemned at Sierra
Leone.

The King of Prussia is on a visit to the Emperor
of Austria.

GREAT BRITAIN.—In Parliament the Government
have asked for half a million pounds, on account
of the Chinese and Persian wars.

Notice has been given of a resolution to continue
the present duty on tea and sugar, for two years
from next April.

Thackeray has been nominated for Parliament
from Oxford.

Lord Palmerston promises a Government surveil-
lance in regard to the supply of free negroes to the
French West Indies.

The House of Lords have defeated the Jewish
Oath's Bill by 34 majority.

The submarine cable is expected to be all on board
the *Niagara* by the 20th of July.

FRANCE.—The French *Assemblee Nationale* news-
paper has been suspended two months, in conse-
quence of an election article.

The Bank of France returns show a loss of specie.

At the second elections in France, Madenez, and
some opposition candidates, were returned.

Spain.—Disturbances have occurred at Ureia,
Spain, but were suppressed.

The Spanish Cortes have passed a gag law on the
press.

Italy.—There have been no further demonstra-
tions at Naples. The details of the outbreak show
a considerable loss of life.

Mazzini has escaped from Italy.

COMMERCIAL.—LIVERPOOL, July 11.—*Cotton.*—

The news from America by the steamer *Canada*
caused an advance of fully 1-16 per lb., the market
closing buoyant with an advancing tendency.—
Sales of the week 67,000 bales, of which 7,000 were
to speculators, and 7,500 to exporters. The stock
in port amounts to 482,000 bales.

Advices from Manchester are favorable, and all
qualities have experienced an advance.

Breadstuffs.—Flour quiet, and a decline of 6d.
is reported. Wheat quiet. Corn buoyant at 1s.
to 1s. 6d. per quarter advance.

Provisions—steady. Beef firm. Pork dull, and
quotations nominal.

Sugar heavy, and all qualities have slightly de-
clined. Tea firm.

LONDON, July 11.—The Bank rates remain un-
changed. Consols, for money, 92½; for account
92½ to 92½. Bullion in the Bank of England has
increased £138,000. Iron firm, and in improved
demand at £7 to £7 5s. Breadstuffs dull. Sugar
quiet, at 1d. decline. Coffee firm. Rice heavy.
American securities are unchanged.

ARRIVAL OF THE EUROPA.

HALIFAX, July 30.

Passage of *Persia* out called eight days, twenty-
two hours and a half.

BRITAIN.—Roebuck, in a speech of much bit-
terness, accused Palmerston of having, by denuding
India of troops for Persian War, brought about the
present state of things in India. Warm debate en-
sued, in which Mr. Roebuck found many support-
ers, but they declined voting for the Resolution.—

Lord Palmerston asserted constitutional right of
Crown to make war or peace, although he admitted
it to be the duty of the Government to acquiesce in
Parliament, at the earliest opportunity, with the
grounds for having done so. After censuring Mr.

Roebuck and his motives, he reviewed course of
negotiations with Persia; claiming credit rather
than censure for concessions his Government had
made to facilitate restoration of peace. Resolution
lost by 38 to 352.

Sir C. Wood gave notice for motion for vote of
2,000 more seamen for service in Indian Seas; half
a million voted on account of Persian War.

Lord John Russell asked, but failed to get Gov-
ernment to give up a day for consideration of new
Bill proposed to be introduced for admission of
Jews into Parliament.

Supposed Parliament will be prorogued in two
or three weeks.

Shipping cable on *Agamemnon* would be finished
the day the *Europa* sailed; would be on board the
Niagara the following week. Continued tests
of the coil are very satisfactory.

British Government intend sending a steam squa-
dron to India; a considerable force of Artillery by
the most rapid conveyance at hand, and in addition
to the troops already mentioned, the force which
had been appropriated for China had all been in-
tercepted and ordered for service in India.

This force is to be compensated for in China by
a Battalion of Marines, to be despatched to Hong
Kong without delay.

FRANCE.—The poet Beranger is dead.

ITALY.—Tranquillity prevails. It is asserted that
recent movement was planned in London, and
therefore Italian Courts, backed by Austria and
France are about to protest against Asylum which
England offers to their troublesome refugees.

It is reported that a meeting of the Emperors of
Austria, Russia and France will be brought about
very shortly on Bavarian territory, and various
movements are added in support of rumor.

INDIA.—Attempts have been made to lay the
charge of the Indian mutiny to Russian intrigue,
but St. Petersburg papers indignantly deny it.

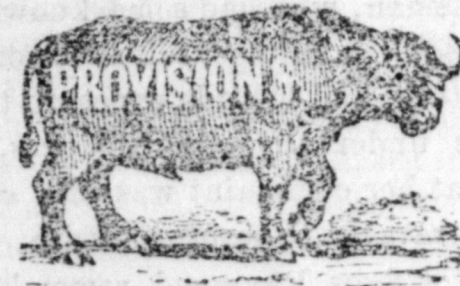
