

proach of a Railroad to our borders—while our sister Counties are quarrelling among themselves as to who should first reap the benefit of a Railroad; acting not unlike the dog in the manger, not willing that others should enjoy what they themselves cannot have. But we do feel interested; and would use our humble endeavours to create a better and more laudable feeling between different portions of the Province. The orthodox doctrine, we believe, is, what benefits one, benefits all presently or remotely; and all should be willing to unite, so far as Railroads are concerned, in building first that line which the nature of circumstances points out as the most central, and best adapted to promote the universal interest of the Province, forming a main artery, from which may diverge branch lines all over the province.

We last week published, among other statements connected with the St. Andrew's and Quebec Railway, (we use this term notwithstanding the censure of the St. Andrew's Standard, merely because it is the familiar name by which the line is known,) one which is a startling commentary upon the figures of the St. John and Shediac line. In the one, 40 miles have cost £2,000 per mile? in the other near £10,000 per mile have been expended. The information came in good time now, when the country had paused in contemplation of enormous expenditures which forbid, almost, the hopes of prosecuting railroads in New Brunswick—telling us, that with ordinary prudence, railroads may be built cheaper than in other countries—cheaper than any we had supposed.

We have received the prospectus of a new paper to be called the *Aroostook Pioneer*, which Messrs. J. B. Hall and W. S. Gillman propose publishing at Presque Isle, Aroostook, as soon as a sufficient number of subscribers can be obtained to warrant the undertaking.

There is now no paper published or press established in Aroostook, and it were an insult to the intelligent people of that noble county to suppose that they will not at once lead their countenance and support to the efforts now being put forth by the gentlemen named to supply the want.

May the same success attend this pioneer of the press that has the pioneer of industry and settlement in the fine county of Aroostook.

ARRIVAL OF THE CANADA.

HALIFAX, Aug. 12.

INDIA.—Rumours were very prevalent that Delhi had been taken, but according to the latest accounts it is generally believed that on Friday evening, on the strength of a communication from East India houses that Delhi had fallen, and after the close of official houses, consols had advanced. *Bombay Times*, of July 1st says: rebellion in Bengal army is universal; not a symptom of disaffection has as yet appeared in the Madras armies. A list is given of fifty-six regiments or portions that have mutinied, while twenty have been disbanded and one disbanded. The fall of Delhi will do more to quash the rebellion than any thing else. At Allahabad all European families were killed, including eleven officers. In Calcutta and neighbourhood great anxiety is felt. A conspiracy for a general rising on the part of the Mussulmen has been discovered, and a regular plan for the capture of the city seized. The ex-King of Oude and minister are found to be at the bottom of the conspiracy, in conjunction with the pensioned King of Delhi. All the native troops in Calcutta and neighbourhood, with the exception of the Body Guard, are disarmed; the defence of Calcutta is entrusted to the corps of volunteer guards, who patrol the streets at night.—The inhabitants keep themselves armed. Public buildings and hotels are garrisoned by sailors belonging to ships in the river.
