

The Agamemnon was to commence taking in the cable at Greenwich on the 9th or 10th of June. All the vessels would rendezvous at Cork Harbor, where the final arrangements will be made.

The period for paying out the cable is the month of August.

The suspension of William Mackintosh & Co., of Manchester, is announced. Liabilities supposed to be about £100,000 sterling.

FRANCE.—The statement that during the late visit of the Emperor to the Museum of Artillery, an attempt was made upon his life is reiterated, and the fact that the English journals containing any reference to this matter, as well as to the Government election policy, were intercepted in the French Post Office gives color to the story.

It was expected that the monthly returns of the Bank of France, to be published in a few days, would show an increase in the stock of bullion equal to more than 10,000,000 sterling.

SPAIN.—Some Cheap Bread Riots had occurred at Grenada. Quiet was finally restored, but the city was nevertheless declared in a state of siege.

ITALY.—The Naples correspondent of the Daily News recounts a large number of continued barbarities on the part of the authorities, and says that a placard addressed to the citizens, calling on them to rise, had been put in circulation.

RUSSIA.—Prussian papers say that the Emperor of Russia is about to reduce his army, and it is stated at Vienna that the St. Petersburg Government has made advances to Austria.

TURKEY.—Vienna correspondent of the London Times says the Porte has forwarded a memorandum to its diplomatic agents in Europe, demonstrating the necessity for some change in the treaties between Turkey and the Italian Powers.

Latest.—In the House of Commons, on Friday, the Sound Dues Question was taken up, and the House voted £125,000 in liquidation of England's share in the redemption.

BELEGIUM.—Official Despatches from Brussels, of 3d inst., declare tranquility re-established, but many petitions against church abuses had reached the Government.

A very strong feeling against the Jesuits continued to manifest itself throughout the country.

A Brussels letter in the Paris Presse says that at a Cabinet Council it was resolved to withdraw the obnoxious Bills on Charities, and that Ministers tendered their resignation, which the King refused to accept.

SPAIN.—Madrid dates are to the 30th ult. The disturbances at Grenada had entirely ceased, but the authorities continued to take military precautions, and were causing bread to be sold to the poor at a reduced rate.

DEATH OF BISHOP PHELAN.—We learned with regret last night of the death of the Right Rev. Bishop Phelan, Coadjutor of the R. C. Bishop of Kingston, and for many years the R. C. Priest in this city, officiating at the Recollet Church, then occupied by the Irish Roman Catholics. Some years ago—especially in the troublous times '37 and '38—Father Phelan's name stood high in Montreal. By his simple kind conciliatory manners, his devoted loyalty, his zeal in works of charity, he won the good will of all, in those good times when bitter religious feuds were unknown among us. Many of the old Protestant citizens of Montreal will feel regret at his death.—Montreal Gazette.

The National Division of the S. of T. are in session at Providence, R. I. Eighteen States and four British Provinces are represented.

THE SHOE BUSINESS.—The Newburyport Herald gives a doleful account of this branch of trade. It says that leather has fallen considerably and labor greatly; yet many workmen are out of employ, and the manufacturers, with little demand and falling prices for their goods, would not care to increase their business, even if the stock could be worked for nothing. It is melancholy to go into one of our shoe towns now, and mark the difference that a twelve month has brought to them.

The Chicago Journal, after a careful review of the statements from the grain growing regions of Illinois, Indiana and Wisconsin, concludes that there is promise of a more abundant harvest this year than ever before. Even in regions where the winter was supposed to have done its worst, the apparently dead wheat is in many instances reviving, while the greater breadths sown, will nearly compensate for the injury done, as to give in the aggregate a crop quite as large as the same territory last year.

A bet was recently made between two farmers in France, about the speed of horses and oxen, with the same load the same distance; the distance travelled was twenty three kilometers, (about twelve miles.) A four horse team was put to a wagon loaded with about 10,000 pounds of beet root pulp.—The oxen were two yoke with the same load. The horses beat them only seven minutes, and would themselves been beaten, had they not been the best in the country.
