ARRIVAL OF THE CANADA.

New York, June 11th, 1857.

Steamship Canada from Liverpool the 30th ult., has arrived.

Cotton continues dull, without quotable change.

Sales last week 40,000 bales.

Breadstuffs firm. The Brokers' circular quoted Flour advanced 1s. on the week, Wheat 3s., and Corn 2s.

Consols 93½ to 93¼. Money market unchanged.

Rejection of Dallas Clarendon Treaty had been announced in Parliament. Lord Palmerston said new conditions from Washington were under consideration.

French Legislature voted to establish three lines of trans-atlantic steamers.

Overland Mail arrived. Chinese news presents no new features.

Henry Knight, a Soldier of the 76th Regiment, stationed at Marshall's, on the St. Andrews' Road, left there with his gun or carbine in his possession, on Tuesday the 26th May. Some doubts were afterwards entertained of his being in his right mind from his staying out and not returning. Search was made in the woods, &c., without finding him. On Saturday last another Soldier, stationed at the same place, named Fox, having some tidings of him, went in pursuit. On Sunday morning the report of fire arms being first heard in the woods, other persons started off in the direction where the guns were supposed to be fired, but without finding any trace of the parties. Knight has since been seen some 20 or 30 miles from St. Andrews', but there are no tidings of the other man, Fox, who, it is feared, has been shot by Knight.—*Freeman.*

JAMES BROWN, Esq., M.P.P.—We learn from the *Patriot* that a Pic Nic party was given last Tuesday, in the neighborhood of St. Stephen, in honor of the above named member for Charlotte. After refreshment had been taken, the toasts of the Queen, the Governor General, our Lieutenant Governor, the Liberal members, the members for Charlotte, Mr. Fisher and Mr. Tilley, "The Hon. Mrs. Manners Sutton and the fair daughters of New Brunswick," and other toasts, were duly honored. There was some good music and much enjoyment.

The Sons of Temperance of the Wesleyan denomination, on Wednesday evening last, presented the Rev. Richard Knight, D.D., Grand Chaplain of the Sons of Temperance, with a very handsome gold mounted Walking Stick and a Purse containing £100, as a mark of their esteem. The presentation of these testimonials was accompanied with a very flattering address, to which a suitable reply was made. It is expected that the Rev. Gentleman, who has been stationed in this city for the last eight years, will shortly retire from this district.—*Nbr.*

CONVICTION AND SENTENCE OF DEATH.—James Kennedy, the party charged with the murder of Wallace, by an assault with an iron bar, has been tried during the week at Windsor, and found guilty of wilful murder. Sentence of death has been passed upon the prisoner. The Jury, upon an inquiry, when the verdict was being taken, on the part of the prisoner's counsel,—R. Haliburton, Esq.,—declined to make any recommendation for mercy. Their deliberations did not extend beyond about an hour. The female indicted as an accomplice was acquitted. The learned Judge as we understand, held out no hope to the wretched man of any probability of commutation of his sentence. During the recess and while the trial was progressing it was made to appear on affidavit that some party had interrogated one of the Jury as to the probability of the issue of trial, which called forth a reply "that he (the Juror) could say nothing about it," or to that effect, and thereupon the prisoner's counsel moved an arrest of judgment. The Judge declined to give any rule, but said he would consult his brethren as to the matter. In the mean time the prisoner remains in the felon's cell, awaiting the order of the Executive.
