WOODSTOCK GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

We had the pleasure of attending the semi-annual examination of this excellent School on Tuesday last, and must say that the proficiency exhibited by the Scholars in their various departments of study, viz., English, geography, the classics, natural philosophy, geology, astronomy, and mathematics—in which they were closely questioned by the examiners, the Rev. S. D. Lee Street, and E. J. Jacob and A. K. S. Wetmore, Esqrs.—was in the highest degree satisfactory; evincing commendable attention and aptness on the part of the pupils, and reflecting influence credit upon the esteemed preceptor, Mr. McCoy. The examination of the different classes was interspersed with recitations, dialogues, &c., in which Masters Williams, Baird, Palmer, J. M. Lean, Connell, Day, Bedell, Snow, Bourne, Street, Beveridge, and C. M. Lean, acquitted themselves admirably.

Seven essays, in competition for the silver medal, (the gift of E. J. Jacob, Esq.) upon the theme proposed by Mr. Jacob, "The past history and future prospects of Carleton County," were read by Masters Dixon, Caldwell, Baird, J. M. Lean, Connell, Wright, and Beveridge; and we doubt very much, if in any institution, of no more pretentious claims than the Woodstock Grammar School, seven more creditable essays could be produced.—The Medal was awarded to Master Wm. Connell, and the second to Master T. Beveridge; the essays of both these young gentlemen we hope to be able to publish. Mr. Jacob stated that the Trustees had much difficulty in deciding between these two, as to which deserved the preference. We may remark that the names of the parties writing the essays are not known to the judges until after their decision is made.

The prize for proficiency in history was awarded to Master John Caldwell, and Mr. Jacob bestowed upon Master Isaiah McCoy a set of books, as a mark of approval for his good conduct, and diligent and successful application to his own studies, and the assistance of others in theirs.

Mr. Jacob, previous to bestowing the prizes, delivered a very appropriate address, particularly upon the necessity of, and benefits arising from, attention being paid to the art of composition.

The Rev. Mr. Street suggested that some means should be adopted to increase the number of prizes to be awarded, and recommended the matter to the attention of those who felt interested in the advancement of a sound education. We may be permitted to say we consider the recommendation of the Rev. Gentleman as worthy of consideration, and we doubt not there are many gentlemen in this community who would be willing, were the thing brought under their notice, to appropriate a few dollars to the purchase of a medal or books, to be awarded as prizes in the Grammar, or other Schools of equal importance.

A large number of ladies and gentlemen were present; among whom we noticed several clerical, medical, and legal gentlemen, and all seemed delighted with the exercises of the day.

ARRIVAL OF THE COLUMBIA.

New York, July 6.

The Collins Steamer *Columbia*, from Liverpool on the 23rd ult., has arrived. The political news is unimportant. Parliament was engaged in discussing the Jewish Disabilities Bill, Ecclesiastical affairs, and cotton cultivation in India.

The general result of the French Elections had not been ascertained. In Paris the Government elected seven, the Opposition three.

The Grain and Vine crops in France are in a magnificent condition.

There had been some popular disturbances in Spain. Additional troops were ordered to Havana.

In England there was a prospect of splendid crops. Breadstuffs tend downwards. Mixed corn declined 1s. 6d. Wheat—Red 8s. 9d. a 9s. 6d.—White 9s. a 10s. Flour very dull.

Money unchanged. Consols 93½ a 94½. Sugar 1s. lower. Coffee and tea in good demand. Other markets unchanged.
