Provincial Legislature.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

FREDERICTON, June 25th.

The course pursued by Mr. Macpherson with reference to the Speaker, (voting with the Liberals for Mr. Harding,) has excited, in the minds of the true Tories, extreme disgust. Some of them have the audacity to say that they knew he would rat. Probably Mr. Macpherson, having thrown off the bonds, will give his energies to assist the Liberals.

Mr. End has, so far, been spokesman for the opposition—although, good man, he professes to be only desirous of serving God and his country.

Judging phenomenologically, the Members of the new House are worthy representatives of the intelligence of the Province, and we hope, as through our columns our readers become better acquainted with them, this judgment may be agreed in by those readers. We must say we think the present a vast improvement on the old House; although a few members who were in that are very much missed—Mr. Hatheway particularly so.

Mr. Gray: I rise, sir, to make a motion which will be responded to by every member of this House with satisfaction and pleasure. There is now present in this House a gentleman holding a very high position in a Sister Colony: I allude to the Hon. Mr. Young, the President of the Legislative Council of Prince Edward Island—who has been for seventeen years a member of the Legislature of that Province, and who now holds Her Majesty's Commission to administer the Government during the absence of the Lieutenant Governor. In order to carry out that course of respectful consideration with which this House has heretofore treated their fellow Colonists visiting them from other Colonies and to cement more strongly the kindly feelings which exist, I move that Mr. Young be invited to take a Chair on the floor of this House.

The Speaker ordered a Chair to be prepared for Mr. Young, and requested Mr. Gray to introduce him—which Mr. G. did.

On motion of Mr. R. K. Gilbert, read a second time—A Bill to disqualify certain office-holders under Government from being elected or capable of holding Seats in the Assembly.

Several Bills of a local nature received a first reading.

At 2 o'clock the Members of the Assembly proceeded to Government House, in order to present the Address in answer to the Speech. On their return His Excellency's reply was read.

On motion of Mr. Lewis, Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency, praying that a detailed statement of the cost of public printing since May 1856, be laid before this House.

Mr. Mitchell moved that an humble Address be presented to His Excellency, praying that a copy of all despatches relating to Railroads be submitted to the House.

On motion of Mr. Allen, the House went into Committee of the whole in consideration of a Bill to amend Act incorporating City of Fredericton.—Mr. R. K. Gilbert in the Chair.—Bill agreed to.

On motion of Mr. Watters, the House went into Committee of the whole on a Bill to repeal certain Acts for the more effectual prevention of Fires in the City of Saint John.—Mr. S. H. Gilbert in the Chair.

The Attorney General, by command of His Excellency, laid before the House estimates of the current year, and other papers, which were received and referred to Committee of Supply.

On motion of Mr. Mitchell.

Resolved, That no practicing Attorney or Sheriff shall be eligible to hold the office of Register of Deeds and Wills, and that an Address, giving this expression of the opinion of the House, be presented to His Excellency.

FRIDAY, June 26.

This morning Mr. End moved, to rescind a Resolution passed yesterday, disqualifying practicing Attorneys and Sheriffs from holding certain offices. Mr. E. contended that it was unusual and improper to legislate by Resolution and Address, when an alteration of the law was involved. Admitting the correctness of the main principle involved, he thought it should be sought by Bill.

A round of animated speeches followed—the only argument in favour of the Resolution being that advanced by the mover. All the Members condemned in severe terms the principle of appointing Lawyers or Sheriffs to the office of Register of Deeds and Wills, and several expressed the opinion that Register of Probates should likewise come under the same injunction. Resolution similar to the one passed yesterday, has several times passed the House, but had always been rejected in the Upper House, which desired not to interfere with present incumbents; therefore the motion to bring it before the Government by address, to insure the principle coming into effect immediately, and establishing a precedent for future action. It was contended that there was no Statute in the books upon the subject.

During the discussion some pretty warm remarks were elicited from Mr. Steadman, and others, with reference to the removal from and appointment to offices, and the principle that those who—holding either leading or subordinate offices—took their offices, went to the polls, became partisans, and took active part to oppose the Government, should be immediately and generally removed, was received by the House with evident satisfaction.

Mr. Mitchell said that such a course he expected the Government would adopt; if they did not, it would very much weaken his confidence in them. Where officers had merely exercised their privilege of voting,—severally, and without exhibiting partisan feeling,—and were eligible to fill their offices with effect, such should be allowed to remain; but it should be understood as a rule, that those who attach themselves to party must stand or fall with that party.

The motion was lost, Yeas being Messrs. Wilnot, McIntosh, Vail, Scovill, Allen, Botsford, and End.

On motion of Mr. Montgomery, read a first time, a Bill to amend Sec. 1, Cap. 9, Title 3, Revised Statutes.

At half past 10 o'clock, on motion of Attorney General, the House went into Supply, Mr. Steadman, on motion, taking Chair.

In introducing the Budget,—that duty devolving on him in the necessary absence of the Provincial Secretary,—the Attorney General said he would not, as was the custom, go into a lengthy explanation, as there was an evident desire to get through with the business as promptly as possible; they had assembled for action rather than debate. From the shortness of the time which the Government had at their disposal many schedules and items of accounts, &c., were not in a shape to submit to the House and place on the journals, which in an ordinary Session would very properly be done. The Attorney General then proceeded to move the resolutions as follows:

1st. Appropriation of £35,000 for Roads and Bridges, including £3,000 for bridge over Grand Falls.

2nd. £110 to pay salaries Clerk of Crown and Usher of Supreme Court.

3rd. For payment of officers and certified expenses of Legislature, £8,500. Of this amount, Attorney General explained, £6,500 had been drawn and paid out, and only £2,000 were asked to cover expenses of last election and present Session of Legislature.

Mr. Mitchell:—I do not know what to think about voting such a large amount without some explanation of the items which constitute it. I have no desire to oppose the Government, as in them I place every confidence; but we have been told that the country is in debt, and that it would be necessary to incur more debt still more; and therefore I think it but just that the Government should lay before the House the particulars of these sums they ask for, especially that part already drawn. The late Government had been accused of extravagance; this would show to the country whether it was so.
