WOODSTOCK, SATURDAY, JULY 4, 1857.

The House of Assembly was prorogued on Wednesday last at twelve o'clock, having been in Session one week, and having in that short time got through as much business as in ordinary Sessions would be spread over a week of weeks.

We are giving a report of the proceedings in regular order for the benefit of our readers, and to that purpose we have appropriated largely of our space this week. After the debates we shall publish some items of the budget, the Accounts during the late administration, and other papers of interest to all; and from the latter, as well as the former, we expect to find much subject matter for future discussion. In the Accounts will be found some startling items of expenditure; for instance, nearly £300 was paid to one man for coach hire for one year, by the late Executive.

One of the most important Resolutions passed during the late Session was that introduced by Mr. Gillmor, to suspend all Railway operations now being carried on by the Government, excepting from St. John to Shediac. This Resolution was introduced before the Government had answered the questions proposed by Mr. McIntosh, and took them all by surprise. The vote upon it, however, takes action out of their hands, and relieves them of the responsibility. While there are some members who are opposed to Railways generally, and others to their being built in particular localities,—the main reasons upon which the House took action on the Resolution were—that an enormous outlay had already taken place; that instead of the Railways costing £5,000 per mile, as contemplated, they had cost, so far, nearer £10,000; that the country could not bear the tax of building Railroads provided they could not be built for £5,000; and other hon. members entertained the opinion that if communication was had with the sister Province of Canada, and the subject brought under the attention of the Imperial Government, assistance would readily be obtained, conjointly to build a grand connecting road from St. John to Canada.

Lawrence were nominated to fill the seat; on Monday next the election will be held. It is said that every possible means will be adopted to keep Mr. T. out, that Mr. Lawrence is the pet of the wholesale liquor-dealers of St. John, who have raised £2,000 for his election, and who, from personal pique and malice, are determined to try and bring upon the reputation of the City of Saint John one of the darkest shadows which ever overclouded it; but it is likewise said that there are independent freemen enough in Saint John to frustrate their wicked designs, and place Mr. Tilley in that position to which, morally and intellectually, no man has stronger claims.

Mr. Light is not destined to have a quiet life of it. We understand there are serious complaints by persons who put in tenders for bridge building between the Bend and Shediac, who assert that some of the contracts taken have not been completed according to specification, and that favoritism has deprived them of contracts. One person we believe is now in Fredericton with a petition to the Governor, and respectfully signed by inhabitants at the Bend praying his Excellency to cause enquiry to be made into the matter. The road between Hall's Creek and Humphrey's Mill we are told is in a bad state, and that is the reason the trains do not yet run. We shall probably soon have particulars.—Leader.

BURGLARY.—When the Central Bank was opened on Monday morning last, the officers immediately discovered that the Bank had been burglariously entered some time since the Saturday evening previous, the vault broken into, and a considerable sum of gold abstracted, leaving all the silver. The burglars forced an entrance into the cellar through a passage through which coals are received, by wrenching off an iron grating. Once inside they then tore away a large portion of the masonry surrounding the vault, and made an opening between two iron doors, took off the locks on inside of one by drilling holes above the key holes, got at the springs of the locks and forced back the bolts.—Having thus got into the vault, they effected an entrance into the safe in the same manner. The work must have been laborious, and could only have been successfully accomplished by experienced hands. They got clear off with their booty, and, although several parties were immediately started in pursuit, they have not yet been apprehended.—The Bank has offered \$2,000 reward for their arrest and conviction.
