

through and understand fictitious patriotism, self-professed independence, and convenient please-all-party liberality. While we regret that Mr. Tupper has unfortunately submitted himself to a defeat—which must inevitably attend the efforts of the "Independent Party" of Woodstock—we are glad that this party has been taught so severe a lesson, and hope it may have, upon its members, a salutary effect.

One statement made by the Solon of the Independent party has been most triumphantly disproved, viz., that Mr. Connell owed his seat in the House to his Ledger, and that the people would take advantage of the Ballot to vote independently, and end Mr. C.'s political existence. The people, through the secrecy of the ballot boxes, have pronounced most triumphantly on Mr. Connell's past conduct; they have pronounced favourably, and declared him to be their man. What an answer is this to the hundred and one slanders which have been heaped upon Mr. C., and through him, upon his constituents, by a certain party!

But we had almost forgotten. We started, intending to give an account of Declaration day.—After Messrs. Connell and Perley had been duly declared elected to serve in General Assembly, then followed some speechifying:—

#### MR. CONNELL

Said his feelings would hardly allow him to speak on that occasion. The result of the present election had proved that the course which he had ever pursued—to do that which was calculated to benefit the country, without regard to ulterior consequences—was a course which the people approved of. In the late dissolution he did not fear an appeal to the people. He relied upon them, and they had shewn, in a manner which he could never to his latest hour forget, that they had confidence in him. The Freeholders of Carleton have expressed, in unmistakable terms, their disapprobation of the advisers of His Excellency; a like disapprobation has been very generally expressed by the different constituencies throughout the Province,—and in his, Mr. Connell's opinion, the present Executive would not meet the new House, but would resign immediately. If, however, they should hold on to their places, the first act of the new House would be to pass a vote of want of confidence in them.—He would, on behalf of himself and friends, take that opportunity to return thanks for the manner in which the Sheriff and Returning Officers had performed their duty on this, the first election under the new law. The Ballot had a trial; with its working, he (Mr. C.) had every reason to be satisfied. It was, however, for the people to say whether they approved of it or not. On this, as on all other subjects, he invited an expression of opinion, and wished the advice of his constituents—and not only of those who had voted for him, but likewise those who had opposed him. He went to the Legislature to represent their interests, and it was of importance that he should know the minds of the people. It had been said that the ballot would seal his political existence, but he had not feared it, and he was not anxious to represent the County any longer than the electors wished it.

#### MR. PERLEY

Thanked the electors of Carleton for the noble and warm support which they had given him throughout the long and severe contest which had just ended. Many false assertions had been made, but he was willing they and their intended effect should be forgotten. He bore no ill-will. Opposition was necessary; but now the canvass was over, and the result decided, he hoped they would all unite to advance the best interests of the County. He had been denounced for not supporting the Government, as had others, but the various constituencies throughout the Province had declared that the present Government was not to be trusted. In St. John and Charlotte particularly, had this been the case, and the new House would have a large majority of Members pledged to hurl them from power. When all the acts of the Government came to be understood, and their accounts printed, the justice of this decision would be more apparent. There had been a great cry of loyalty, and of the constitution going to be overturned; but there were no grounds for it. The Governor had been, by the conduct of his Council, involved in a serious difficulty, but he (Mr. P.) trusted he would get out of it safely. Through the mismanagement of the Government the finances of the Province are in a bad state, and would present serious difficulties to the new House,—so that in judging their labors at first, this fact should be remembered.

Had the result of the election in Carleton been different, it would have caused general surprise, as that County had the name of being thoroughly liberal. He (Mr. P.) was sorry for Mr. Tupper, his opponent; he was a man of many good qualities, but had been guided by bad advice. He again returned thanks for the handsome support afforded

him, and trusted that by his acts he should continue to merit that support and confidence.

#### MR. GROVER

Said Mr. Tupper was prevented from being present by sickness, but had requested him (Mr. G.) to return to the electors his sincere thanks for their support, and to express the hope that the gentlemen elected would serve them faithfully.

The utmost good order prevailed during the day, and notwithstanding the excitement, excellent feeling was displayed. In the evening the boys had a bonfire on Webster's Hill, after which, as a grand finale, some excellent fire-works were set off by W. W. Hammond, Esq.

A friend in Fredericton has furnished us with a description of Declaration day in York County. Some reference made by Mr. Allen to the *Carleton Sentinel* and its Editor, which we were fortunate enough to hear, shall receive some comment at an early day; when, if, after reviewing what we have said of that gentleman, we find it to be anything which "we did not believe," we will acknowledge it.

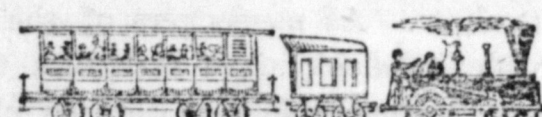
