NEW YORK, May 14.—The 41st anniversary of the American Bible Society was held to day. Hon. Theo. Frelinghuysen presided. After prayer by Chancellor Ferris, and an address from the President, the annual report of the Treasurer was read. The receipts of the year were nearly \$142,000, being upwards of \$49,000 more than last year.

THE HUDSON'S BAY COMPANY.—The Montreal Herald has advised from England to the effect that the Hudson's Bay Company is to be allowed to retain its territory, on the condition that they shall give up such portions of it as from time to time may be required for the purpose of colonization.

A College of Agriculture has been established in Michigan on a handsome farm of 700 acres. It has an endowment of \$56,000, and in each of the last two years the Legislature has given it \$20,000. Students are admitted without fee, but are obliged to labor three hours each day.

A ROAD FROM CANADA TO NEW BRUNSWICK.—It appears by the Report of the Board of Public Works of Canada, that a road from the Riviere du Loup on the St. Lawrence to New Brunswick, has been in process of construction during the year. The commissioner says that this may be considered the chief if not the only line by which the supplies can be furnished from Canada to those engaged in the lumber trade in the North-western part of the State of Maine, and of New Brunswick.—*State of Maine.*

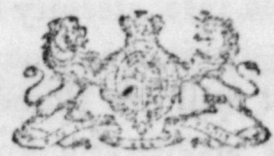

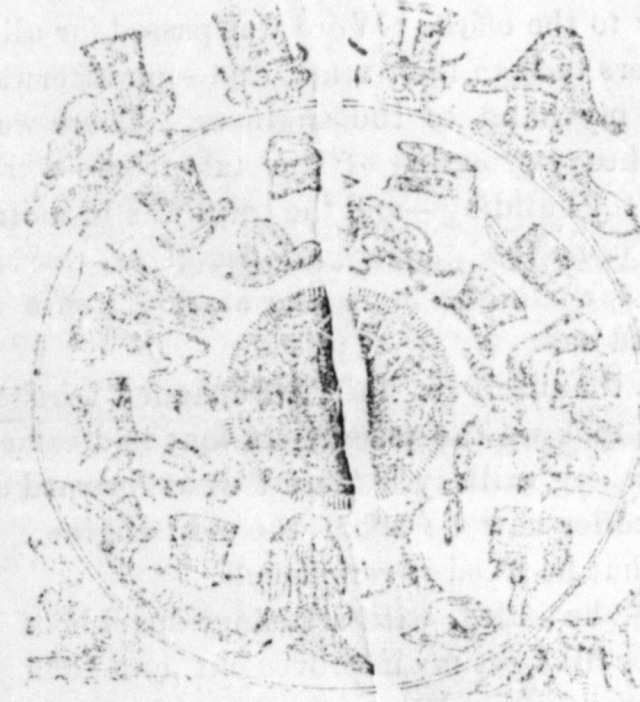
