Bombay mail, July 3d, reached Suez on the 23d. The recapture of Gwalior is confirmed; the rebels lost 27 guns, besides elephants and treasure to a large amount. The fugitives from Gwalior are said to be hemmed in on all sides by the British troops. On the 13th, Sir Hope Grant gained an important victory at Newab Guage, near Lucknow, capturing a large number of guns, and driving the enemy across the Cogura. On the 9th, the celebrated Moulvie, for whom

£5000 had been offered, was killed. Oude continued much disturbed.

Details of Sir H. Grant's victory, near Lucknow, state that the rebels were nearly 20,000 strong, their loss 6000 men and 6 guns, while the British had 6 killed and 30 wounded. The fight lasted three hours, and the rebels were utterly
