Woodstock, January 12, 1858. The Councillors elect for the County of Carleton, being assembled and their qualifications duly recorded, proceeded to elect a Warden, when George Secretary Treasurer.

Mr. CLOWSE briefly thanked the Council for the honor conferred upon him, and promised to bestow his best energies to the proper discharge of his du-

The Warden commented upon this statement as rebutting that which had been industriously circulated that the County was some £200 in debt. On motion, the Council proceeded to the election of a Secretary Treasurer, when Mr. M. Lauchlan

was re-elected. Mr. Perley, County Auditor for 1857, read his report, and stated that he declined taking the office for another year, when, on motion, the Council proceeded to appoint an auditor.

Mr. KILBURN read an application from J. H Jacques, asking for the appointment. Mr. LINDSAY nominated Samuel Watts; Mr. Hartley seconded the nomination, when, a ballot having been taken, Mr. Watts was declared unani-

mously elected. Mr. KILBURN moved, that until the return of the Chairman of the Parish elections for Kent be received, the Councillors elect for that Parish be not

allowed to take their seats. He (Mr. K.) had no objection to the gentlemen returned for Kent, but feared a dangerous precedent would be established which might hereafter be taken advantage of to an injurious extent.

The motion however was not seconded. A protest was read against the return of members for Brighton, on account of alleged improper

conduct of Chairman. Messrs. LLOYD and ORSER were heard in the matter, and some considerable discussion took place,

but the protest was finally dismissed. This protest charged the Chairman, Mr. George be held. Stickney, with several very serious derelictions of duty-charges which, we must confess, we did not consider the gentlemen heard in the matter sustained; and we do think that in such a case the party implicated should have an opportunity of meeting his accusers and hearing their complaints, and showing their falsity if he wished. There seems to be a mistaken notion abroad respecting the power vested in the Council, with reference to protested elections. We consider-and it is the fair construction of the law-that when a duly qualified Chairman returns members, and those members properly file their oath of qualification, the Council must recognise them as the sitting members. The Chairman being open to prosecution for non or mal-performance of duty, and the member for perjury, in case of a false oath of qualification. Mr. GALLOP was opposed to the motion. Woodstock was already very favorably situated, so far as regarded facilities for having public improvements made, and was quite able to assume the expense of the one in question. The two representatives to the Legislature resided there, and she had a Council of her own, and they were quite capable of taking care of themselves. This petition was only intended to give an excuse for clipping off the amounts granted to the out parishes. If they granted the Richardson, prayer of this petition there would be plenty more of a similar nature in before they were adjourned and there were other ferries where repairs and improvements were needed more than at the one under discussion. Hayden's Ferry was one where there was much more travel. He would oppose any money being laid out at Woodstock.

Mr. LINDSAY hoped the gentlemen would divest

themselves of sectional feelings, and remember that Woodstock was part of the County of Carleton .-He was there to legislate for the whole County. In the ferry-the improvement to the approach to which they were now discussing-not Woodstock, but a large portion of the County was interested; Kent, Brighton and Northampton, much more so than Woodstock. There were some gentlemen who were always opposed to any motion which seemed to point at expenditure of money in Woodstock .-Since he first had a seat at the Council Board, not one-sixth of the County funds had been appropriated within the bounds of the Corporation of Woodstock, nor had there been any special grants for her; he hoped while members endeavored to get justice they would be willing to give justice. Mr. HEMPHILL said the out parishes were the ones

most deeply interested in, and most to be benefited by, the measure under discussion. The ferry alluded to was the most public one in the County. This was the only petition before the Board; when others came to the same effect they could be treated according to their relative merits. Mr. KILBURN could see no objection to the Coun-

cil expressing a favorable opinion on the petition, especially as it was for the benefit of the people of these important parishes. The interests involved were general, and they should in considering the subject avoid sectional prejudices.

Mr. GRAY said they should not allow any warmth of feeling to make them forget that they were assembled to legislate for the whole County, without reference to local jealousies or sectional feelings .-He would move the following resolution :

Mr. LINDSAY could not say about the £400, but thought all must admit the wharf was a great benetown and country people.
