THE VILLAGE SYSTEM OF INDIA .- A writer in the 4 0 0 Colonial Church Chronicle gives an exceedingly interesting outline of the village system of India :--The village system of India is one of the most remarkable features of Indian civilization of the 5 0 0 Hindú is inferior to our own, but in some particulars it is in advance of ours; and one of those par-CHARLES SHEA. ticulars in which it claims the advantage, is a fact that every Hindú village is an organized munici pality. The greater number of English towns. 10 0 and all English villages are mere collections of houses, without any bond of connection or corpo-5 0 rate life, without rulers, without office-bearers, and without any organization for the preservation or advancement of the common interest. In India, on the contrary. every village of any 13 0 0 respectability is an incorporation. It has its.council of head-men, its rights of jurisdiction, its revenues, and its meetings for the transaction of public 12 0 0 business. Generally every village has its watchmen, its artificers, its priests, its astrologer, appointed by the community, and paid by means of 5 0 endowments of rates ; besides a village monsiff (or pretty unpaid magistrate) a mirastar or potail. (x sort of mayor and revenue commissioner) and an accountant, all nominated by the community, and appointed by Government. The municipality 7 0 0 makes itself responsible for the settlement of disputed claims by arbitration, for the punishment of petty offences, and for the preservation of the peace 13 0 0 and though courts and cutcheries have been established in every province for the administration of justice on the European plan, nine-tenths of all the cases that arise are investigated and settled by the heads of the village under the council tree, with-8 0 out any reference to Government authorities ; and it is astonishing how much legal skill, how much judgement and good temper, these village punchay-8 0 0 ets exhibit.
