





The attempt to launch the steamer was a failure as before stated.

The London Times says when the nydraulic rams began to work, the order was distinctly given to " wind up," meaning to coil in the slack between the drum and the cradle. This was accordingly done at the forward drum; but, unfortunately at the stern of the vessel the men did precisely the reverse, and uncoiled more slack chain. Among the number of engineers looking on, the danger of this was seen at a glance, but there was no official to check the men, the fore part of the vessel then slipped, and the stern rushed down rapidly-she seemed to slip three or four feet.

In the course of a few seconds the strain upon the drum caused the windlass to revolve rapidly, same: Ships on the stocks, in harbor or in dock; River and the iron bars struck the men and huried twe Craft and their cargoes; and Farming Stock of all descripup by some violent explosion. men at the lever on the other side of the drum stood firm, and, hauling their tackle, drew their lever up and applied the break on the drum with such terrific force that the ship instantly stopped, though she seemed to quiver. under the sudden

check, as if she had received a heavy blow, and the check-tackle and massive pile of timber which restrained the drums strained audibiy. The whole of this took place in the course of two or three seconds. The vessel dropped, the men were huried from the windlass; and with a heavy, rumoning noise, the tremendous structure was still on the " ways' again, almost before the spectators had time to imagine what had occured. For a moment

there was rather a panie, and a disposition to run from the spot ; but it was only momentary. It ap-

pears that the toothed wheels of the windiass were broken; the damage was, however, of no consequence. At forty-five minutes past twelve o clock she had slipped down the ways about three feet, at the forward drum, and four feet three inches at the one fixed ait. The stern had progressed, of course, about six feet towards the river.

At 1.45 everything was again ready to move her still further ; again, from out of the dense mass of the timber of the cradles came the little missing noise, at regular intervals, which told that the enormous pressure of the hydraulic rams was found





PRODUCTION OF CAST STEEL BY A NEW PROCEES .- May 2. The process invented in England for the manufacture of cast steel by smelting charcoal bar and charcoal pig together, is one of much value. According to this method, the operator puts into a common melting pot charcoal bar iron, clipped in pieces of about one and a half inches long, and adds to this ner, and then run into ingot moulds. By this process cast steel is obtained suitable for any purpose

to which cast steel, made on the old plan, can be affords. Charges moderate.




