Q. 1. "What are those certain principles upon which the administration are making changes in the officials? Upon what principle was Mr. Garden dismissed from the office of Sergeant-at-Arms."

Q. 3. "What are the public works which are vigorously yet prudently advanced?"

The public works are, Railways, Grand Falls Bridge, Hampton River Bridge (completed, we believe,) improvement of the S. W. Branch Miramichi River; as likewise the preparation of plans, taking of measurements, &c., of some ten different bridges in various parts of the Province, -including some between Fredericton and Woodstock,-the building of which bridges is to be let as soon as said plans, &c., are completed so that they can be proceeded with immediately. There may be other works of which we do not know, or which we do not think of at the moment.

Q. 4. "What are the exigencies of the Province which are provided for?"

An answer to this question cannot be very satisfactorily given now, because all the acts of the Government, which may justify our statement on this head, are not come-at-able, but we recommend on the part of the Journal a small degree of faith; and then, when the time comes, and the doings of the Government are fully developed, we trust to find our confidence not misplaced, but our statements now made in good faith, fully substantiated, but what we now are aware of on the point at issue we give. We know that a large amount of specie, ordered by the Government, has just arrived from England, testifying at once to the provident spirit of the Government, and the credit of that Government and the Province at home.
