We cannot wonder that, here as elsewhere, peo ple seem impressed with the fear of coming evil-a prophetic dread, lest their own neighborhood should become the scene of the commssion of some diabolical crimes such as have lately been witnessed in St. John, Fredericton, and elsewhere. All seem to feel a suspicious uncertainty, which prompts to many little measures for security and defence before unthought of. Doors are now barred, on which hitherto the latch was merely dropped.
