Bridge over the River. We published week before last a resolution passed by our County Council, at the recent session of that body, having reference to the building of a bridge across the river at this place. With the terms of that resolution our readers are acquainted, and we need not recapitulate them now; but we may say that it contained, in brief, cogent and indisputable arguments in favor of the scheme it proposed. We have before this alluded to the necessity which calls for the erection of a bridge at Woodstock, and urged upon the Government the propriety of taking the matter in hand. Now that our opinion has been endorsed by the people of Carleton, through the almost unanimous voice of their representatives at the Municipal Board, we shall expect that immediate action will be had in the matter by the Government, and that it will be prepared to enter upon an early prosecution of the work, or else be prepared to show to the country sufficient reasons for a delay. We were much pleased by the unanimity displayed by our Councillors while deliberating upon the resolution above mentioned, and with the spirit they displayed in demanding this year have been less by one half than of last year, bridge at the hands of the Government, in view of the great public benefits to accrue from it, as a right, -an act of justice toward Carleton County.
