INSOLVENT DEBTORS BILL.

1. When any debtor shall be owing debts to the

amount of one hundred pounds, or upwards, and

unable to pay the same, he may apply, by petition,

to the Clerk of the Peace of the County in which

he resides, setting forth, upon oath, in his applica-

tion, a full statement of his real and personal prop-

erty, assets and liabilities, the names and residences

of his creditors, and the sums due to each of

them, the nature of each debt, and whether found-

ed on written security or otherwise.

2. The Clerk of the Peace, on such petition being

filed, shall call a meeting of the creditors of such

debtor, by giving three months public notice thereof

(A) in a newspaper published in the County

where the debtor resides, if any be there published;

if not, in the Royal Gazette, of the time and place,

and object of such meeting; and the object of such

meeting shall also be posted up for thirty days before

the meeting in the offices of said Clerk, the Sheriff,
