**SMOKE FOR WOUNDS.**—A correspondent of the Country Gentleman has written the case of a horse which was just ready to die of an old and festering wound. Fortunately, he adds, at this stage of the case, an old Pennsylvania teamster came to our relief and recommended smoking with old shoes. A smoke was made of old shoes, soles and all, cut in pieces, in a hog trough, and placed under the wound. In a few hours the swelling wholly subsided, and the sore commenced discharging matter—the horse was saved.

Some years after this I heard two persons talking about a horse which had been gouged in the abdomen. In this case everything had been tried. At my suggestion he was smoked, and when I next heard from him, the old horse was well. So much for old wounds.

In the same year I cut my foot with an axe. The lady of the house seizing the foot while it was yet bleeding freely held it over a pan containing smoking tag licks. In a few minutes the bleeding stopped, and the smoke was removed, and a bandage applied to protect it from accidental blows. The wound never matured and consequently never pained me. I have seen this remedy tried many similar cases, and always with the same results. The reader, therefore, may be assured that you have merely to smoke the wound well, and nature will do the rest.

I suppose the smoke of burning wood would produce the same results, but it would not be so manageable. There is a principle in the smoke of wood, when applied to the flesh, which causes the albumen, thus rendering it unabsorbable of putrefaction. The same principle stops bleeding by coagulating the blood. It promotes healing, and may be applied with decided benefit in almost all ulcers, wounds and contusions. For chapped hands, and lips, molasses is the best remedy ever used. If my cows have sore teats, or an ox chafes off the outer skin so as to occasion the blood to start, I apply molasses.—Country Gentleman.

**THE WASHINGTON TRAGEDY.**—The Washington correspondent of the New York Times, in an article on the shooting of Key by the Hon. Mr. Sickles, says:—  
"Mr. Sickles, the member for the Third District of New York, is a native of Washington, and was originally a printer by occupation. He is a man of nearly forty years of age, of good presence and graceful manners. As a member of the State Senate, as well as in the House of Representatives, he had made himself remarked by a quiet unusual coolness and self-possession, which gave him great advantage in debate, and had acquired for him a well-earned reputation as a rising young leader in the Democratic party. In 1853, Mr. Sickles was married to his wife, now ruined and heart-broken, then a young girl fresh from her school-life, and remarkable then as now for something especially soft, lovely and youthful in the type of her peculiar beauty. She was of Italian origin, and possessed all the Italian luxury and depth of eye, united with a singular candor and delicacy of feature."

"Mr. Sickles married his wife when she was sixteen years old. He took her to England, where, under Mr. Buchanan's patronage, she was introduced to the Queen; carried her to the Continent and introduced her to the most fashionable society. Mr. Sickles loved her with great devotion and lavished all his means upon her. They lived in elegant style, Mrs. Sickles occupying a house of \$5000 rent. Mrs. Sickles rode in a splendor of equipage with outriders; jewels to the value of \$5000, and seemed to want nothing that she did not have."

"Mr. Key is a nephew of Judge Taney, and brother-in-law of Mr. Pendleton, member of Congress from Ohio. The father of Mr. Key was the author of 'The Star Spangled Banner.' Key and Sickles were both the intimate friends of the President."

During the last year of his life he was made free of the Astor House, and often times this erratic man of genius could be seen accepting his hospitalities when other doors were closed on his fallen fortunes.
