ARRIVAL OF THE EUROPA.

Latest quotations-Consols 961.

HALIFAX, July 26. Europa arrived at Halifax yesterday. By letters from Paris much discontent prevailed there regarding terms of peace, and small results of war, although peace gave general satisfaction. [From the London Morning Chronicle, July 8th.] The European world is relieved-let us hope not for the moment only-from a grave and justifiable alarm. The contest in Italy had arrived at the point at which the utter discomfiture of the actual aggressor seemed imminent, unless he could enlarge the area of the strife. It was no groundless fear, the belief that Germany would be drawn in as a supporter of Austria, and that, as a consequence, the war would become European. The attitude of Prussia and the other chief States of the Confederation, had, at least, become menacing. It was more than possible that at any moment the overtact would be committed, for the results of which history would in vain would have sought a parallel. But war has done its appointed work. Taking the shape it has done in Lombardy, it is the shortest road to peace. The unequal contest between the Franco-Sardinian armies and the Austrians could no longer be maintained. Once more the stubborn spirit of the House of Hapsburg is rebuked and quelied by the genius of a Napoleon. * * * In the absence of details it would be premature to do more than express a fervent hope, that all the good temptation of ambition and the lust of military of the Italian question.
