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THE LONDON TIMES ON UNIVERSAL SUFFRAGE.
The London Times, in a recent article upon American Politics, declares that, for the most part, men of ability and education in the United States do not engage in the scramble for office, and that, in consequence, public employments are filled by the intellect of the learned professions, in short, by those who have the necessities or want of delicacy do not render them adverse to a career from which better men shrink with disgust. The Times attributes this result to universal suffrage, and says that in England, where four out of every five men are disfranchised, the representation is far superior to that of the United States. The House of Commons may safely be entrusted with the power to change the Ministry at their will, because at present constituted, they will not be likely to abuse the trust. But the Congress of the United States could not be thus empowered to change the President and his Cabinet whenever they should disapprove their policy or measures, because, from the class of men who compose Congress, they would make possibly changes from the advantages they might possibly derive from a new distribution of the public plunder. So the Times says.

POPULATION OF THE GRAVE.—A correspondent of the Rising Sun, gives the following, which he has gathered from various reliable sources:—From extensive calculation it seems the average of human births per second since the birth of Christ to this time, is about 815; which gives about 32,000,000,000; and after deducting the present supposed population of the world (900,000,000), leaves the number of 31,100,000,000 that have gone down to the grave; giving death and the grave the same tally over the living to the number of 32,000,000,000. Of the number in the grave, about 9,000,000,000 have died in war; 7,500,000,000 by famine and pestilence; 500,000,000 by martyrdom; 580,000,000 by intoxicating drinks; 12,000,000,000 natural and otherwise.

Mrs. Begg, the youngest sister of Robert Burns, the poet, and the sole surviving child of that family circle of which he was the eldest brother, died quite unexpectedly at her cottage, near Ayr, on the 14th ult., at 84 o'clock A.M. Isabella Burns, or, as she was familiarly known, Mrs. Begg, was born at Mount Oliphant, near Ayr, on the 25th of June, 1771, and had lived till her next birthday, she would have completed her 84th year. She was the seventh child and third daughter of William Burns and Agnes Brown, the members of whose family we mention in the order of their age: Robert, Gilbert, James, Isabella, William, John, and Isabella. About the year 1794 or 1796 she was married at Mossgiel, Manachline, to John Begg, who was accidentally killed at Lesmahagow, in 1813, and whom she thus survived for the long period of 48 years.

SEA-SICKNESS.—In a book just published by M. Jolard, a cure is proposed, which at all events has the merit of novelty. The author commences by stating that sea-sickness is not occasioned by any chemical agent, such as a peculiar effluvia emitted by sea water, the condition of the atmosphere, or such like; and that, consequently, medicine can relieve it, but that it is caused by the mechanical action of the bowels, which are made to vibrate by the heaving and pitching of the vessel, and to strike against the diaphragm. The liver and gall-bladder, thus exposed to repeated percussion, emit a larger quantity of bile than usual, and retching is the necessary consequence. M. Jolard, therefore, simply proposes to tie down the intestines so as to prevent their jolting, which may be effectually done by two belts, one passing under the throat, and the other between the legs.

The father of the Jewish child Mortara is about to settle in France. A letter from Rome in the *Gazette de Liege* states that the Sacred College at Rome has resolved to prevent the recurrence of any case similar to that of Mortara in future, by directing that Christians shall not in future be allowed to enter the service of Jews.

PROJECT FOR TUNNELING DESERTS.—A French gentleman has a proposition for turning the sands of the desert to good use—in short, of burning them into lumps for the construction of a tunnel. He says that all Governments that have existed in Algeria lavished to create a communication between the north and the coast of Africa, and none of them have succeeded. Algeria, provided with railways, might become the entrepot of the commerce of the Mediterranean with all the people of the south, and rise to the grandeur of Carthage. This sands of the desert, says the author, consist, during nearly their whole length, of soda, lime, and certain salts, and the heat of ordinary furnaces these sands do not fuse, but when subjected to from 2000 to 4000 degrees of heat they form, not glass, but agglomerations sufficiently strong for the formation of durable works. This result is proposed to be arrived at by concentrating the rays of the sun by means of an Archimedes mirror. Thus arched blocks are to be cast, which, placed one against another, will form a tunnel as far as the desert extends. This tunnel, it is said, might easily be protected against the simoom and the columns of sand; and supplied with water from artesian wells, would be the grand central artery of Africa, through which, bringing with it the raw materials of Europe in exchange for the raw materials, of which the richness and variety are incalculable.—*Building News.*
