Having returned home, after an absence prolonging beyond what we had intended, too late to prepare anything for this week's issue in the shape of Editorial, we are compelled to resort to our scissors to supply the deficiency. And first we take from the *Globe* the following, upon a very interesting subject:

"While large numbers of persons from the Eastern States are taking up and settling on lands in the Aroostook County, attracted thither by the fertility of soil and great natural advantages, it becomes a matter of surprise that in the very neighborhood, and lying on Grand Falls, say some ten or fifteen miles from Grand Falls, there are large estates, which still remain in their wilderness state."

"Several adventurous settlers have penetrated into these wild lands, and their industry and perseverance have been abundantly rewarded. We are told on good authority, that the soil is of the very best description. A number of law surveys have been made in the County, and the eastern side of the River St. John, and from five to twenty miles from the flourishing Town of Woodstock, a good bridge over the river at Woodstock, and a turnpike road running thence and through the centre of long meandering from 1 to 1000, present an opportunity for the selection of superior land never before offered in this Province."

"A Book containing a well-defined map of the Province may be had upon application to Mr. A. Liverpool; Mr. B. Cork; Mr. C. Glasgow, or the following persons, (a friend in every shipping port in England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales; also, New York, Boston, &c.)

Clever men, natives of England, Ireland and Scotland, acquainted with life in New Brunswick, and the resources of the country, sent home to lecture through the rural districts and towns of the old country, would aid much in directing emigrants, few of whom at present know Montreal from Boston.

Fearing I have trespassed too much, I must again desist until another time.

ENTER, with a view to its settlement. The valuable lumber of the country is gone, and what have we as an equivalent? Our trade is protracted, and the tide of emigration is turned from, not toward us. The "hand-book" has been a "finger board," as difficult to be discovered by the emigrant as its contents to be understood. The common sense of the matter would appear to be, that in order to be successful in peopling this county, we must adopt the American course: wherever good blocks of land are to be found, lay them out into lots for settlement: give people an easy access to them by good roads and bridges; then advertise, not in the *London Morning Chronicle*, but in papers read by the industrious, hardy, laboring people, English, Irish and Scotch. Assuming that members of the Government will pardon my presumption, I append a plan of card applicable to the condition of settlers on Crown Lands in this neighborhood:

NOTICE TO EMIGRANTS—Persons desirous of settling in New Brunswick (a British possession in North America), are hereby informed that lots of land containing 100 acres each, well wooded, and the soil of a superior quality, may be found in the County of Carleton, in the eastern part of the River St. John, and from five to twenty miles from the flourishing Town of Woodstock. A good bridge over the river at Woodstock, and a turnpike road running thence and through the centre of long meandering from 1 to 1000, present an opportunity for the selection of superior land never before offered in this Province.

"Three fine engines belonging to the city, and valued from \$2000 to \$3000 apiece, were destroyed. Two of these had been placed in building but a few hours before the fire commenced.

"There were nearly four thousand contributors to the exhibition, some of whose losses were quite large. The American Institute lose \$10,000.

"The loss is variously estimated at from \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000. The palace originally cost \$800,000. One estimate makes the worth of the articles on exhibition about half a million.

"(Not to interfere with and *Locate* the same, which may have been done within one year previous to the date of the application for Licence.)

"In all cases of competition the purchaser must immediately pay the amount of purchase money, or else the birth will be again offered for sale, excluding bids from the defaulter."

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., October 21.

THE PARIS PRESS HAS PUBLISHED THE CORRESPONDENCE BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES MINISTER AND THE NICARAGUAN FOREIGN MINISTER OF THAT REPUBLIC, TOUCHING THE CONVENTION OF "FELIX BELLY."

THE AMERICAN MINISTER DECLARES NO ARRANGEMENT OF NICARAGUA WITH BELLY SHALL BE RECOGNIZED OR ASSENTED TO, IN ANY THING THAT IS CONTRARY TO JUST RIGHTS ACQUIRED BY AMERICAN CITIZENS; AND THAT THE LIBERAL POLICY RESULTING FROM THE TRANSIT TREATY OF NOVEMBER LAST, SHALL BE CONSISTENTLY MAINTAINED.

THE NICARAGUAN MINISTER REPLIES THAT HIS GOVERNMENT WISHED ONLY JUSTICE AND ITS RIGHTS, AND DESIRES FRIENDLY RELATIONS WITH THE UNITED STATES, BUT DECLINES TRANSIT TREATIES OF NO VALUE, BECAUSE NOT OPENED AT STIPULATED PERIODS.

BELLY APPELED TO CLAYTON BULWER FOR PROTECTION, AND LORD MALMSEY, IN LETTERS TO BELLY, TELL HIM "SITUATION OF THE TREATY WILL NOT APPLY TO HIS SCHEME IF CARRIED OUT."
