The physical geography of this region deserves notice, as it bears directly on the relations of the trade of the State of Maine, with New Brunswick. The great feature of this whole region east of Bangor, is the St. John river. It takes its rise in the western part of Maine, on the same parallel of latitude as Woodstock and Houlton, and taking a cir-, cular sweep north, forms a complete semi-circle, in an actual distance of nearly 400 miles, to Woodstock. Bere the St. John discharges more water than the Connecticut or the Hudson. It dra'na northward the great mountain region, which occupies the centre of Maine, and discharges its waters into the Bay of Fundy, 160 miles from Woodstock . through tide water at Calais, is less than balf that distance from this point. Looking at a plain chart of the country, without any indication of its topography, one would say that the St. John should have turned its course into the St. Croix.
