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

A NEW GARDEN IMPLEMENT FOR TRANSPLANTING. -We have before us a new Tankee invention, for which a patent is applied for by John Burgum of Concord, N. H , which we think deserving of the notice of all who have occasion to transplant small garden plants or flowers from one bed to another. or from the ground to pots. Imagine e tapering pint tin pot, with the bottom cut off, and the cup split up and down into halves, and these halves attached to two handles, like those of a stout pair of shears. By opening the handles, so as to spread the halved cup a little apart, and thrusting it small end down, into the ground upon each side of the plant, and then pressing the handles together, the dirt is pressed around the roots, and the plante may be lifted out and set in its new place directly from the implement; or any number of them may be laid upon a board or in a box for distant removal.
